# NOBLE LADY DEAD.

LIFE OF BARONESS BURDETT COUTTS IS ENDED. Was at One Time the Richest Woman

in England and Gave Unsparingly of Her Wealth for Charitable and Noble Purposes. London, Dec. 30.—The Baroness Bur-

lett-Coutts, who has been ill at her residence here since Christmas eve, is dead. Besides depriving the country of one of its greatest and most famous philanthropists, the death of the Baroness reoves from London life a unique peroality and interesting social figure. Her life was a link with the past, for she Her life was a link with the past, for she was born on April 21, 1814, during the reign of the Emperor Napoleon, and has lived during the time that five British Sovereigns occupied the throne. The dead Baroness was the daughter of Sir Francis Burdett, Bart, M. P., representing several English constituencies, while ng several English constituencies, while ter mother was a daughter of Thomas boutts, a banker. Her full rame, com-ining that of both father and mother,

bining that of both father and mother, was Angela Georgina Burdett-Coutts.

At one time she was probably the richest woman in England, the basis of her forture being the celebrated old Coutts Bank, where, it is said, half the secrets of English aritocracy are concealed. Few people have made more noble use of money, her name having figured at the head of nearly every charitable and philanthropic enterprise for balf a gentury. She founded many institutions for redicting the distressed or uplifting betury.
