New York, June 29.—Noon Letter.—The early market, after an attack by trades and some influential offering, turned strong. Good many statements of Harriman roads are expected in the near future. The railroads are showing much improvement in cooperative grocers earnings and are prepared for increased business. Rumored that some large industrial orders are to be announced after the Democratic convention. Idle cars along the Pennsylvania lines are disappearing. A prominent Stock Exchange trader calls attention to the fact that after a period of panic and depression, the country hastens to new high level of prosperity and business expansion. Our local bank surplus of \$66,000,000 compares with \$2,500,000 last year. \$36,000,000 in 1904 is the largest since 1894.

Among other things, this suggests what powerful manipulative machinery is awaiting action of inside interests in stocks. One comment is that if there were no discounting of traffic wages Steel common would soon be above 75.

The coal and iron ore holdings of the C. F. I. are very conservatively estimated \$170,000,000. We believe there is solid basis for extreme optimism.—Ennis Stoppani.

A gall stone, so called, is merely thickened bile. It hardens and hardens until the stones are formed. They are formed in the gall bladder, or biliary duct, and are of various shapes and sizes, from that of a pea to that of a small cherry. A dozen, or in extreme cases, half a handful, may occlude or close the biliary duct. They cause an arrest of the flow of bile. In extreme cases when that occurs the pain is severe, often agonizing. If medical relief fails a surgeon is called in, when an operation is in order. In the olden days any opening of the abdominal cavity generally meant death. To-day, thanks to anti-septic surgery, scores and scores of equally important major operations are performed without a fatal result.—New York Herald.
