A DREADFUL CATASTROPHE. (Special to The Telegraph.)

QUEBEC, Aug. 29-The great Quebec bridge collapsed this afternoon, and now the vast mass of steel work lies a tangled wreck across the St. Lawrence channel, while so far as can estimated 84 men have lost their ives in the disaster.

The bridge fell exactly at twenty-hree minutes to six this evening, just as many of the workmen were prepar-ing to leave. It was, however, so horribly effective in wiping out the lives of the men employed on it that very little is known as to how it happened, and those who are left are so con-pletely benumbed by the horror of the situation that they can do little to, aid

It was the southern extension of the bridge which collapsed and this was rapidly nearing the zenith of the immense steel arch which was to span the river. For 800 feet from the shore the massive steel structure rear-ed an arch, with no support but the piers from the shore and one pier erected in the river about 200 hundred feet from the shore, while the outward extremity was 180 feet above the water
