The famous Salmon River Bridge among other matters, engaged the attention of the members. Mr. Blair condemned the management of the Board of Works Department in the matter of contracts for bridges, asserting that the bridge building was in the hands of a ring, and citing the cases of the Tabusintac, Southwest Boncton, and Ferry's Point bridges, in all of which he gave figures to show that very large sums had been paid for "extras," outside the first contract price. In the case of the Southwest Bridge, the amount for extras exceeded the sums paid under contract by \$37,000. \$38,837, was the contract price for the Moncton Bridge, \$60,000 had been expended. It did not reflect creditably on the management of the department, that it did not approximate more closely the contract price to the actual expenditure. He was not at all satisfied that the Salmon River Bridge was required, and Hon. Mr. Landry had made a poor beginning in letting out the contract pric it.
