## SPAIN.

A Republican movement has taken plece in Spain at Malaga. On the 18.h the garrison was attacked by persons proclaiming the Republic. The troops resisted, and order was soon re-established. Five of the insurgents were killed ; the gurrison had 7 men wounded.

MADRID, Nov. 21.-The force of the artillery is fixed at 12,000 men, the engineers at 3,600. and the cavalry 12,000. Tranquility is restored at Mala a. There has been some sight disturbances at Madrid ; numerous arrests were made among the lower classes.

#### SWITZERLAND.

The Times' Paris correspondent says that it appears that the Federal Council of Switzerland would have no objection to release the prisoners of Neu'chatel on condition that the King of Prussia renouences all claims to the sovereignty of that canton. It is not probable, however, that his Majesty will show any disposition to make that concession.

PRUSSIA.

The Prussian government has the intention of increasing the duty on salt to 15 thalers per ton.
