CANADA NOW EXPECTED TO FINANCE HERSELF

Much has been said during the past two years of the necessity of Canada financing herself. The need of this was brought home early in the war through the closing of the London money market to Canadian borrowers. When the United States entered the war this was repeated in that country. With the doors thus closed against her, Canada undertook to do her own financing, and astonished both herself and the rest of the world by the results of the two Victory Loans.

Since the signing of the Armistice Canadian financial leaders have been saying that Canada must continue to finance herself as she has been doing during the last two years. Reliable reports from London show that a similar opinion is held there. In a recent issue the London correspondent of the Montreal Gazette, himself a Canadian and thus well acquainted with conditions both in this country and in the United Kingdom, said:

"Canada is expected to meet her needs in the British market as they fall due. About twenty-five millions become due in June. The British claim that if Canada can offer credits to European countries she cannot expect Britain, which needs all her available money, to extend credits to Canada. This view is endorsed by Canadians here, who feel that we must finance our growing foreign trade on our own money, and not on British loans."

War savings stamps are part of the plan that it is hoped may enable Canada to finance herself. Those who buy thus lend their money to the Gov-
