LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

The Conservative Candidates for Charlottetown are Dr. McNeill and P. S. Brown.

George E. Hughes and Dr. Warburton are again the Liberal Candidates for Charlottetown.

Last Thursday was declaration day for Prince County. Mr. Lafreny was declared elected by 83 majority. Tomorrow will be declaration day for Queen's and King's.

In consequence of the severe storm on Monday, the steamer Northumberland was unable to cross to Point du Chene and returned to Summerside. Consequently there was no foreign mail, via Summerside, on Monday night.

It is expected that Archibald Campbell will be the Speaker of the House of Commons in the new Parliament and Senator Dandurand, Speaker of the Senate. Chas. Marcell is spoken of as the Deputy Speaker of the Commons.

Mr. and Mrs. Ernest A. Earle are registered at the Royal. Mr. Earle will assume charge of the Royal Bank of Canada agency in this city. He has been assistant manager of the branch at Vancouver, B. C.—St. John Star.

While in a fit of temporary insanity Mrs. Thomas Corbal, Orford Avenue, Halifax, took the life of her six months' old child, Early Friday evening the body of the infant was found in a well one hundred yards from the house in which the Corbal family resides.

At the Liberal Conservative convention held at Murray River on Saturday last, Mr. A. P. Frowe, of Murray Harbor, was nominated as Assemblyman, to the place of Mr. George A. Fole of Lower Montserrat, who was obliged to retire in consequence of the illness of his brother and business partner.

London, Nov. 14.—The governorship of Chelsea Hospital, rendered vacant by the death of Field Marshal Sir Henry Narman, is to be offered to Earl Roberts. Lord Roberts is now in South Africa, so it will be some little time before his decision is known. It is hoped it may be accepted by him, as no one is better fitted for this high post. Apart from the honor, it carries with comfortable allowance and a splendid house, with some of the finest rooms in London. It will be remembered that the position was offered to Viscount Wolseley when he left the war office, but he declined it.

About twelve o'clock, noon on Saturday Mrs. Campbell Atkinson, of Glouce Bay, C. B., met her death from a rifle in the hands of her husband, who is a member of a recently formed Rifle Club, and who was making preparation to attend a preliminary practice. He had filled the chamber of his rifle and it was supposed that it was locked. His wife was in the room with him when the rifle discharged. A bullet struck the unfortunate woman just above the thigh passing through her body and out the other side and into the wall of the room.

Word was received here on Monday of the death of A. H. Notman, assistant general passenger agent of the C. P. R. Mr. Notman was a sufferer from consumption, and two months ago left for Los Angeles, where he has a brother. His condition did not improve, and he died on the train returning to Toronto. A widow and five sons survive in Toronto. He was thirty-four years of age. The news of Mr. Notman's death will be read with great regret and some surprise by friends who number many in this city. They knew he was very sick, but it was not thought death was so near. For a number of years Mr. Notman was in charge of the passenger business of the C. P. R. on this division and proved a most capable and popular official, his record coming in promotion to a higher place in the company's service. Lately he had filled the responsible position of assistant general passenger agent, but a few days ago was compelled by ill-health to leave work for what was intended to be several months rest and recuperation. C. B. Foster, as noted elsewhere, left here only yesterday to take Mr. Notman's place during the latter's absence; now he will in all probability be Mr. Notman's successor in office—St. John Telegraph.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

The steamer Princess made the round trip between here and Picton on Monday in the howling storm, arriving here on return at 11:20, p. m. The passage was very rough.

St. Barbe is the last district in Newfoundland to be heard from in the elections, and has reported that the Government nominee wins, defeating Keesworthy, Independent, and Bradshaw, Opposition, by plurality of 281. The Bond Government holds thirty seats in the new legislature and the Opposition have only six. All departmental officers were re-elected, making bye elections unnecessary.

Shortly before 11 o'clock on Friday night fire started from the electric wires in the ceiling of W. P. Dillon's barber shop, on Queen Street. The firemen were summoned and when the brigade arrived, they had to take up a part of the floor of the composing room of the Watchman, over head in the last building in order to locate and extinguish the fire. This was promptly done; but not without the material of the Watchman, on which there was no insurance, getting a bad wetting. Mr. Dillon's furniture was removed without much damage. We are pleased to learn that the mishap to the Watchman will not delay or prevent its publication regularly.

A Halifax despatch of Monday said: The storm which swept over the American coast yesterday and caused much damage, struck this city last night.

In the early evening rain fell, and about midnight the storm increased to a gale from the southeast. Telegraph wires along the line suffered greatly, many lines being down and no connection could be had with Boston, New York, or other American cities. The tree to St. John street was blown down in front of the latter and in very poor shape. The storm is reported to be very heavy in some of the Upper Canadian cities and in Montreal it was a wild night. No damage is reported hereabouts and it is thought that shipping on the coast suffered very much as waves of an approaching storm were sent out early in the day.

Commencing Monday, Nov. 21st the all change in the time table of the P. E. I. R. will go into effect. The express train for Tignish leaves at 8 a. m., as at present, and the afternoon train at 4:40 p. m. instead of 5:30 p. m. as at present; the express train from the Northumberland is due at 9:15 instead of nine as at present. The morning train for the east will leave here at 6:55 a. m., as at present, and the afternoon will leave at 3:20 p. m., instead of four o'clock. The morning train from the east will arrive here at 9:30 a. m., and the afternoon train at 4:20 p. m. There will be no connection from the east of Royal Junction in the morning but the afternoon trains will make connection there.

On Wednesday evening last the Coroner's jury in the Warren murder case reported to the Coroner that they could not agree upon a verdict. In this emergency the Coroner, in accordance with the law, turned the jury over to the Supreme Court. On Thursday afternoon the jury came before the Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Hodgson. The Judge explained to the jurymen that they need not necessarily name the criminal in their verdict; but merely bring in a verdict as to how Harriet D. Warren had come to her death. The jury retired and after an hour's deliberation brought in the following verdict: "Harriet D. Warren, on the thirteenth day of October, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and four, was feloniously, wilfully and of malice and aforethought, killed and murdered against the peace of our Lord, the King, his Crown and dignity." Michael Power, Jr. was brought into court and his preliminary trial commenced before Stipendiary Magistrate McDonald. Witnesses were examined on Friday and Saturday. On Monday the examination of witnesses was continued until the afternoon, when an adjournment was taken for a week.

News of the War.

Tokio Nov. 11.—A report from General Nogi's headquarters before Port Arthur, dated Nov. 9th, says the enemy's militia warehouse situated in the Northern part of Port Arthur was bombarded Nov. 6th with heavy siege and naval guns. The bombardment caused a conflagration. On the afternoon of Nov. 6th the magazine of the old battery on Sung Chow Mountain was exploded by our shells. Manurian and headquarters before Nov. 10th says: On the night of Nov. 8th two companies of the enemy attacked our outposts, but were completely repulsed. All is quiet in other directions.
