## Some Recent Discoveries Of Popular Interest

### Wag Your Ears to Prevent Deafness.

Can you wiggle your ears? If so, don't neglect the accomplishment, for, if ever you should find yourself beginning to grow deaf, it may prove of great value in helping to ward off this misfortune. Such in a nutshell, is the advice a great physician has given in a paper on training the muscles of the ears. Most children can move their scalps at will, and many of them can make their ears wag. This ability, through lack of practice, is generally lost, but it is by no means rare among adults.

This physician thinks that the muscles of the internal ear can be stimulated by such grinning, and he has devised three series of exercises for the purpose. The first consists of contracting in turn the muscles of the lips, nostrils and eyelids, aiming ultimately to reach the ear. The second is devoted to the contraction of the frontal and occipital muscles alternately, and then the muscles behind and in front of the ears receive attention. Lastly the muscles of the eustachian tubes are exercised by directions which, Fernet gives in detail.

### Plants Hair on The Baldest of heads.

The hair-grafting process of Dr. Szekley of the Budapest hospital is reported in Germany by Dr. A. Havas to be achieving considerable success. A fine gold wire—about one-fifth hundredth inch in diameter is formed into a tiny hook over a fine hair from a woman's head, and this hook is inserted under the skin with a hollow surgical needle, properly sterilized. The wound heals, after some inflammation but slight pain, with the hook under the skin and the two ends of the hair projecting. About 625 punctures to the square inch are made and about 500 hairs an hour can be planted. To cover a completely bald head about 50,000 hairs are required. They are dead hairs, which do not grow, but with occasional oiling are kept in good condition, and one person is said to have still an excellent head of hair that was implanted seven years ago.

### Gets Electricity from Clouds of Dust.

The curious experimental electrical machine described by a Scotch physician to the Cambridge Philosophical Society depends on dust.

When clouds of dust are raised—either by the wind or by artificial means—they are always strongly charged with electricity, which is positive or negative according to the nature of the material; and it is possible to obtain a continuous supply of electricity by using suitable apparatus to drive a dust-laden stream of air through an insulated tube.

While the dust is passing the tube will yield a steady stream of sparks, sometimes more than two inches long. The air escaping also carries a charge which in a room may be retained half an hour or more.

The charge is probably due both to the actual raising of the dust and to friction of the dust against the tube. Such dust may be used as flour, sulphur, road dust or fine iron filings.

### Wind Killed Soldiers; Not Wounds.

A French physician has just described to the Academie des Sciences the phenomena known in military surgery as wind contusions. During the wars of the First Empire numerous cases were cited in which soldiers had suffered severe injury, and had even been killed, by the nearby passage of a projectile or by its distant explosion. These cases have been deemed legendary. Dr.

Laurent, however, observed during the Balkan war soldiers without any wound who showed signs of cerebral-spinal shock, evidenced sometimes by simple concussion, by tingling and twitching, and even by partial paralysis.

Graver disturbances induced a cataleptic condition and were sometimes fatal, yet the French M. D. was unable to find any nerve lesion. He thinks that they are due to the vibration of the air produced by the passage of a cannon ball and to the sudden variations of atmospheric pressure impinging on the middle ear and giving rise to inhibitory phenomena.

### Noise One Cause for Neurasthenia.

A physician writes: "That noise is one of the causes for the prevailing disease, neurasthenia, there can be little doubt. I have found in the course of my long experience that neurasthenics recover much more quickly in the quiet atmosphere of the rural districts than in the metropolis. The inevitable first remark of a city man upon arriving in the country is, 'How quiet it is!'"

"In fact, city people often become so accustomed to the hurly-burly that the absence of noise in the country gets on their nerves, and some are unable to sleep on spending their first night in a farmhouse."

"It is reasonable to suppose that the constant noises and vibrations of the city must cause continuous nervous shocks, and these, if they do not cause, must at least aggravate the condition known as neurasthenia."

"A French physician was recently quoted as saying that experts who have studied the effects of noises on the nerves and brain matter are convinced that the modern malady of neurasthenia is directly attributable to the riot of sounds by which we are daily assailed. That conclusion was drawn from the investigations of Paris physicians."

### The Latest About Rheumatism.

It is said that acute rheumatism is an infectious disease caused by a living organism, and that it should be classed among the acute specific fevers. Relapse in these means reinfection, and in the case of acute rheumatism it is very commonly believed that the infecting agent "lies peron" in the tonsils or naso-pharynx between the relapses, gaining access to the blood and giving rise to new arthritic manifestations as often as a relapse occurs. Good reasons have been given for believing that the throat is a common channel for infection.

A Scotch physician has brought forward experimental evidence to show that in rabbits, at any rate—animals in which the virus of acute rheumatism readily produces an arthritis with a tendency to relapse—the infecting organism can be recovered and cultivated from the synovial membranes of the larger joints in the intervals between the relapses. This authority concludes also that relapses in human beings are due likewise to the germs remaining in the joints.

### Discovery of Brazil

The first white man to visit Brazil was Pedro Alvarez, a Portuguese navigator, who landed near the site of the present city of Bahia April 22, 1500. Other navigators are alleged to have touched the Brazilian coast prior to that time, but there are no records or other proofs to substantiate such statements. Cabral christened the country Terra da Santa Cruz, or Land of the Holy Cross, and took possession in the name of the Portuguese monarch. No attempt was made to found a permanent settlement until 1549, when Tomas de Souza was dispatched to the country as governor. It was at about this time that the name of the Portuguese South American possession was changed to Brazil, because of the

red dyewood found in the forests, which at that time was imported to Europe from the East, and was known as Brazil wood. That part of Brazil along the coast was distributed among the Portuguese nobles, who were to establish colonies, and who received a number of Indian slaves in addition to the land. For more than a century England, France and Holland disputed the Portuguese claims to Brazil, and founded settlements there, but were eventually driven out. Brazil became an independent empire under a Portuguese prince in 1822, and remained such until a quarter of a century ago, when the republic was established after a bloodless revolution.

### Canada's Latest Golf Course.

Golfing enthusiasts will be interested to learn that the distinguished author, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, during his tour of Canada, planned for the Province of Alberta a new golf course. During Sir Arthur's visit to Jasper Park the location of the golf links was under discussion. As a golf enthusiast who has played on the world's most famous links his advice was sought and he laid out a course that is likely to meet the demands of the most exacting players. There was a fine stretch of suitable land near the site chosen by the Grand Trunk Pacific for the summer hotel which they are to erect in this great National Reserve. Sir Arthur said that no more picturesque spot could have been chosen for the Royal and Ancient game. Two miles distant Pyramid Mountain rears its head and in the intervening space are two lakes.

### To Represent U. S. A. In Prince Rupert.

The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway authorities in Montreal have received advice that the United States Government in recognition of the growing importance of Prince Rupert, has appointed an American Consular agent there. This is an unusual distinction for a young city. Seven years ago the first white man set foot on the spot where Prince Rupert, with its 6000 inhabitants now stands. Mr. Jorgen C. Christian sen. has been chosen for this new post.

That the public are still nearly as imprudent as they were in the days of the South Sea Bubble, in the matter of speculation, is shown by the crazy rush for shares in oil companies in the West, following the strike of oil there a couple of weeks ago. Over seventy oil companies have been formed, we are told, though only one or two have yet any oil to show. The consequences, of course, will be disastrous.
