THE MAIL ORDER HOUSE.

Brilliant Strategy.

The King of France, having march-
ed his 20,000 men up a hill one day,
assembled a council of war and com-
manded the General Staff to submit a
plan of campaign.

Accordingly the General Staff, after
a grave discussion lasting all night,
drew up a minute.

"It is evident," the minute recited,
"that a vital emergency impends. To
leave so large a body of troops where
they are in our opinion inexpedi-
ent, and for a number of reasons,
namely:—

"1. It would embarrass the com-
mander, disturb the entire machinery
of the War Office, and perhaps com-
pel some of the clerks to work over-
time.

"2. It would withdraw the forces
from the garrison towns, where they
are needed to keep up the social at-
mosphere.

"3. Finally, it would imperil the
defences of the realm, shake public

confidence, and depress business.
Possibly there are not properly ob-
jects of consideration at our hands,
but we venture to speak of them.

"Our unanimous recommendation
is, therefore, that the 20,000 men be
marched downhill again."

The King was graciously pleased so
to order. Nor did His Majesty stop
there, but with his own Royal hand
decorated the members of the Gen-
eral Staff in recognition of their bril-
liant strategy.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, April 3.
The real work of the Yeto Bill, de-
signed to restrict legislation by the
Lords, began to-day with the opening
of the Committee stage in the House
of Commons. The scene in the House
indicated the intensity of public inter-
est. Every available ticket of admis-
sion was disposed of days ago, and
hundreds, who had hoped to witness
the proceedings, were disappointed.
The debate will be long and keen. Al-
ready over a thousand amendments
have been prepared. It is the avowed
intention of the Government to
send the measure to the Lords by the
middle of May.

Special Evening Telegram.
WASHINGTON, April 3.
Representative Foster, of Vermont,
ranking as minority member of the
House Committee on Foreign Affairs,
predicted while in the House to-day
that Arbitration Treaties would be ne-
gotiated between four great powers of
the world, naming Britain, France,
Japan and the United States. These
powers would enter into such an
agreement, that other Powers would
be forced to take similar action. He
had had personal conversation with
the Mayor of Tokyo, and other promi-
nent Japanese, and believed that the
sentiment of Japan would favour
such an agreement.

Special to Evening Telegram.
NEW YORK, April 3.
The greatest fight for an eight-hour
day in many years, is contemplated,
and a monster strike is plan of ma-
chinists here. The strike is schedul-
ed to take in all union machinists
throughout the United States. Five
thousand machinists here yesterday
made preliminary arrangements. The
strike will be felt in every manufac-
turing section in the country, and will
involve a hundred thousand men.

Special Evening Telegram.
PARIS, April 3.
A general marine strike is threaten-
ed by the national federation of labor.
A proclamation to workers in the
Docks, and in Atlantic and Channel
ports to cease work, has been issued.
Employees in Mediterranean ports
have been told to keep in readiness to
walk out. Hundreds refused to work
to-day.

LONDON, April 3.
Ambassador Reid is receiving, for
presentation to the State Department
at Washington, numerous resolutions
adopted by City and Borough Coun-
cils of the Kingdom approving Presi-
dent Taft's suggestion for a complete
Anglo-American Arbitration Treaty.

CETTINJE, Montenegro, April 3.
The Turkish bashi-bazouks, summon-
ed to the aid of the beleaguered gar-
rison at Tuzi, routed the rebellious
Albanians with great slaughter. The
Albanians were driven to the moun-
tains.

DUBLIN, April 3.
The Corporation of Dublin voted by
42 to 9 to proceed with the next busi-
ness, when resolutions, proposing a
loyal address on the occasion of King
George's visit, were introduced to the
meeting to-day.

WASHINGTON, April 3.
Representative Mann, of Illinois, has
been unanimously chosen as the Re-
publican candidate for the Speaker-
ship, by the Republican caucus.


