A HARD WINTER On the Labrador.

Great Shortage of Fur--Huskies and Indians Have Hard Time --Some Die of Starvation-- They Lose Their Dogs Thro' Lack of Food---Writer is tried of Eating Partridge Twice a Day for 3 Months.

From a letter by a resident on the Labrador we learn that times have been especially hard on the Labrador during the past winter.

The writer states that:

"During my 21 years' experience of this country, I have never seen a winter like the present, and if it was not that the inhabitants did fairly well both with fish and salmon last summer, the demand for relief would be something fierce. As it now stands, quite a number had sufficient provisions to last them until about the end of February, but now, (Feb. 25th) most are out and every day more or less are coming for assistance. Many trappers with from 100 to 150 traps, to date have not caught a single skin, not even an ermine. Last year about this time I had purchased about six thousand dollars' worth of furs, while to date I have not one hundred dollars worth on hand. To make matters worse there is no chance of much improvement, as with the exception of a sign of a few mink and otter inland, all other fur bearing animals seem to have utterly disappeared."

"At the head of Hamilton Inlet, where at least 600 foxes were secured last season, when I visited there two weeks ago, only seven had been caught."

"The problem is what has become of them. The majority of the trappers believe that they contracted distemper last spring and all died."

"The Northern mail reached here last week, and the accounts from that part of the coast, if possible are even worse than here, as not only have the fox hunt failed, but the seal catch as well. This latter has proved a very serious matter at the Moravian Sta-

tions, as not only the natives, but the dogs as well partly depend upon it for a living. I am informed that most of the latter have starved to death and the Huskies have had to remove to the woods, so as to be near firewood, having, now they have lost their dogs, no means of hauling it to their homes at the Moravian Stations. My correspondent also makes the remark that not a single fox has been caught by the Esquimaux at any of the Moravian Stations.

"The Indians that hunt inland inside Davis Inlet are also up against it, having either missed the deer last fall or otherwise there was none for them to miss, as a gang came out early in December in a starving condition, bringing the news that six of their number had died of starvation, and that many others were in such a weak state that unless provisions were speedily got to them they would follow suit; however, I believe Gaurreau got provisions to them in time, as on the 24th ult the majority if not all the gang had reached the Post, most being in a shocking state, the poor fellows had done nothing with fur, and Gaurreau hardly knew what to do for them, but by first winter mail I instructed him to allow no one to starve, so if my letter has reached him he will have something to act upon."

"Only one poor solitary deer has been killed in this Bay to date, and if it was not that partridges were fairly plentiful, we should ourselves be pretty short of fresh meat, however, I suppose we ought not to complain, but after having partridges twice a day for the past three months one is apt to get rather tired of them and long for a change."

LONDON, June 11. Yesterday morning at Marlborough House, the residence of Queen Alexandra, a man named William Woodley, an escaped lunatic, eluded the guard of police and soldiers and broke into the Palace. He roamed about through many rooms, and finally went to sleep in a bed in a room on the first floor. The Queen Mother was not in residence, but Princess Victoria was. When the intruder broke in she was sleeping in her apartment. The lunatic was discovered by a housemaid at 8.45 this morning.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, June 11. The Home Rule Bill entered the Committee stage in the Commons today, and the discussion is expected to last until Parliament adjourns for vacation in August. As to the ultimate outcome, so far as the Commons is concerned, it is a foregone conclusion. Most members are apathetic, and the general public are becoming weary over the continued talk, in which nothing new is found. The Nationalists are showing a patient expectancy. Their attitude is that the least said the soonest mended, so the full strength of the party sits silently listening, without attempting to intervene or prolong the struggle with unnecessary speeches. The Unionists bear the greater bulk of the burden in debate, and have already booked amendments covering forty-five pages of parliamentary papers.

LONDON, June 11. On the resumption of the Titanic enquiry, Attorney General Sir Rufus Isaacs announced his intention of submitting to the court that the wireless despatch which notified that ice had been seen on the route of the Titanic was handed to Bruce Ismay in his capacity as managing director of the White Star Company, and because of its serious character. Smith handed him the telegram. Sir Rufus said that was extraordinary. Sir Robert Finlay interjected: "It certainly would be if your views were right." Sir Rufus retorted: "I am not satisfied there was not any conversation if you challenge me to say that we have only the word of one person; the other is dead."

Sir,—With reference to your letter to His Majesty's Consulate at Christiania, of the 29th ultimo, asking to be furnished with figures showing the catch of codfish in Norwegian waters by motor cutters, I have the honour to inform you that, under instructions from the Acting British Consul for Norway, I applied to the fishery Office in this town for the information desired.

It appears, however, that there are no figures obtainable showing the catch by motor boats alone; but the Director of Fisheries has supplied me with statistics, which are enclosed herewith, showing the number of vessels of different types employed in the cod fisheries in the most important districts during the last three years.
