Your Boys and Girls.

Florizel Arrives

Filled With Freight and Passengers—
Schedule for Season Closes September 15th.

The Red Cross Liner Florizel, Captain W. Martin, arrived in port from New York and Halifax at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Owing to the delay in the handling of freight at Halifax the ship was late getting away from there. The run from the Nova Scotia port was made in 44 hours. She brought a full freight, including deck load and 100 passengers, including 77 round-trippers. The following passengers got off here:—

TOURIST TRAFFIC.

The tourist traffic by the Red Cross steamers for this season will far exceed all previous seasons. There are seventy-seven round-trippers on the Florizel now, the lateness of the season notwithstanding, and we hear that the S. S. Stephano, leaving New York to-morrow for this port, is practically filled up with holiday-makers. The notable increase in the passenger trade by the Red Cross boats is attributable to the fact of the few American people crossing to European countries on account of the war.

SCHEDULE CLOSES.

The Stephano and Florizel will cease running on schedule time, that is making round trips fortnightly in the New York-Halifax-St. John's route on the 16th inst., to-morrow week, when the Florizel will be ready to sail from New York. After that date either steamer will take seven days for the round trip, with an interval of ten days here between the arrivals of the steamers. Of course when the change is brought into effect the freight capacities of the ships is enlarged to enable them to carry more cargo than ordinarily and there-

The Citizens' Committee

The Citizens' Committee met in the Board of Trade Rooms last night to discuss the new Municipal Bill. The Secretary of the Committee read a report submitted from the Secretary-Treasurer of the City Council showing the number of houses sewered and unsewered.

Twenty-six sections of the Bill were read, several being deferred. It was agreed that the section dealing with the purchase by tenants of land held under lease be accepted with the following amendments:—(1) that instead of 20 year purchase the number be the quotient of 100 divided by the current rate of interest; (2) that the powers of the Conciliation Board apply to new leases as well as to those already in force.

The proposal to make the person getting in water pay the whole cost and repairs of the branch service pipe, was voted down, but it was agreed the applicant for water should pay the cost beyond the street line. Should the branch or service pipe be more than 60 feet long the party in question should only pay for the surplus over 60 feet.

Section 120, a very important part of the Bill, dealing with turning off the water in the houses of persons six months in arrears to the Council for water rates will come up for discussion at the next meeting which is called for Sept. 18th.

Household Notes.

An appetizer of some sort is indispensable for luncheon or dinner in hot weather, and it may be a vegetable cocktail, a fruit soup or fruit cocktail. Fruits can almost always be canned satisfactorily by cooking in the open kettle, but vegetables keep much better if put in jars first, then sealed and sterilized.

It is possible to make an excellent bread with breadcrumbs and graham flour. The crumbs, of course, should be dried thoroughly and ground in the food chopper.

Iron bedsteads can be very successfully cleaned by using a damp cloth and a little cooking soda. Soda is also very good to remove stains from the sink.
