### Undergo Great Risk in Mediterranean.

This morning Secretary Pava of the Board of Trade received the accompanying letter from Colonial Secretary Bennett:

Sir,—I have the honour to acquaint you, for the information of the Board of Trade, that His Excellency the Governor is in receipt of a cablegram from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, which conveys the information that the Admiralty consider that the sending of sailing vessels into the Mediterranean, east of Alicante, involves very great risk to vessels and crews. It is consequently pointed out by the Secretary of State that all communications from May 6th, respecting the licensing of shipments of fish and fishery products to Greece, should be read subject to the above.

### Wounded Seven Times on July 1st

Pte. S. Clarke, a wounded veteran of Gallipoli and the Somme, who returned on three months' furlough on Thursday, went out to his home at Whitbourne by to-day's express, accompanied by his mother. Pte. Clarke, whose duty it was to perform the dangerous work of cutting barbed wire entanglements in front of the enemy's trenches, has had several narrow escapes from death. At Gallipoli he was stricken with dysentery and for several weeks was confined to hospital. After recovering he rejoined his regiment at Ayr and was later on sent to France. In the big drive of July 1st he was wounded seven times, one bullet cutting his right cheek and removing the bottom of his ear; the other six entered his legs and body.

### Police Court

A 43 year old blacksmith, drunk in charge of a horse, was released on depositing \$5.  
A number of truckmen were summoned by Mayor Gosling for not paying their licenses. They were each fined \$5 or 14 days, out of which fines the taxes were paid.  
Three butchers of Kelligrews were summoned by Inspector O'Brien for a breach of the slaughter house regulations. Each defendant was fined 2 or 7 days.  
Another butcher was also summoned for killing without a license. The case was dismissed.

**CHURCH PARADES.**—The C. C. C. will attend last Mass at St. Patrick's Church to-morrow morning. The Volunteers in training will hold their usual Sunday church parade to-morrow morning.

**A BIG FISH DAY.**—Several thousand quintals of codfish were landed from the various schooners along the water front yesterday, and about 500 quintals were brought overland to the city from nearby outports.

**RUSHING CONSTRUCTION.**—The construction of the concrete basement of the new church in Hoylesdown was commenced yesterday. A large number of men are employed and the work is being rushed.

**COAL SCHRS. REACH BAY ROBERTS.**—The Aquilla and Excelsa reached Bay Roberts yesterday from North Sydney with cargoes of coal. Both ships left the latter port within a few hours of each other and the race down to Conception Bay was a close one.

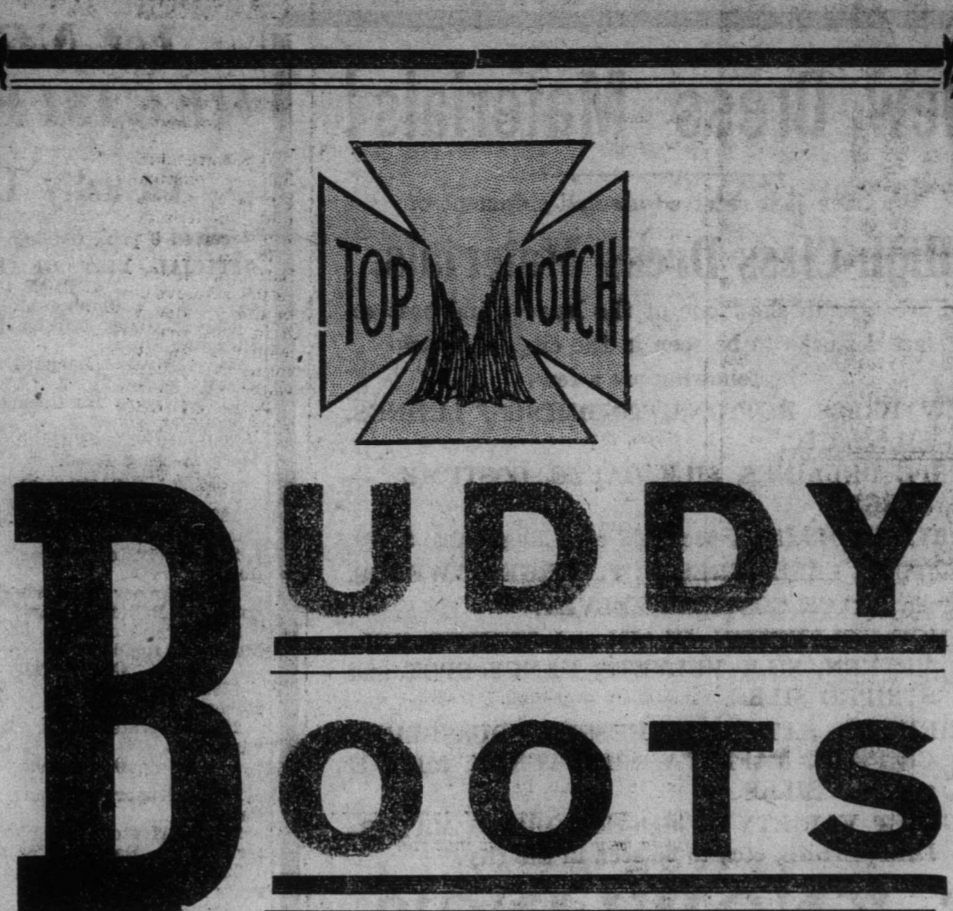

**INSTALLING NEW SMELTING POT.**—Expert workmen are now busy installing a new smelting pot at the Electric Smelting Works, and within a few weeks they expect to have it ready for operation. The pot is about twice as large as the one now in use, and with both working a considerable quantity of metal will be turned out during the coming winter. Besides smelting copper ore, it is proposed to run several other metals which have recently been secured from different parts of the country.

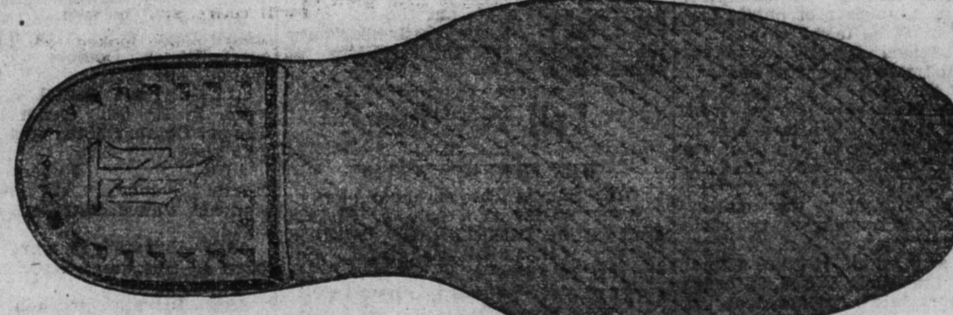
