Pte. S. Clarke, a wounded veteral of Gallipoli and the Somme, who re turned on three months' furlough on Thursday, went out to his home at Whitbourne by to-day's express, ac-companied by his mother. Pte. Clarke, whose duty it was to perform the dan-gerous work of cutting barbed wire gerous work of cutting barbed wire entanglements in front of the enemy's trenches, has had several narrow escapes from death. At Gallipoli he was stricken with dysentery and for several weeks was confined to hospital. 
