

MR. DUNN'S LETTER.

We print in another column a letter from Mr. Dunn, in which he complains that our article of Monday on the school question contained personal insinuations and reflections directed against himself, and that we were anxious to make the public believe that he was the writer of the article in the Advertiser which called forth ours in reply. We must say that Mr. Dunn is exceedingly thin-skinned and sensitive when he makes such a complaint. He was not alluded to in the slightest degree in the article in question until his name came up in connection with the Grammar School, and then we can honestly say—and the public can bear equally honest testimony—that we advanced nothing in the shape of insinuations. We thought we indulged in the plainest language which no one could mistake or misconstrue. With regard to any reflections affecting Mr. Dunn's position and professional character, we were careful to give facts in relation to the Grammar School—facts too which cannot be gainsaid—leaving it to every individual reader to form his own opinion, or shape his own reflections, as he might choose. Mr. Dunn is also much aggrieved because he imagines we sought to make the public believe he was the writer of the article in question in the Advertiser. We never sought to do any such thing. We believe—for it is the common talk of the town—that the small thunder of the Advertiser is now manufactured by a corporation of writers—composed we may be sure of men of rare ability and experience—one of whom, report says, is Mr. Dunn himself. But we never imagined for a moment that Mr. Dunn would shoot at such small game as our Grammar or Common Schools. We were always in the belief that it was the great social and political problems which engrossed his most serious attention—that having a special mission to reform the world all his energies, all his talents, and a fair share of his time were occupied with that object, and that he left all small and trifling questions to the "juniors" to discuss as best they might. Such being the case how could we for a moment suppose that Mr. Dunn was the "writer" in question.

We have no wish to disparage or undervalue the status and influence of the Grammar School though Mr. Dunn is inclined to think so. But the unjust charges preferred against the Board of School Trustees by the Advertiser, in which the whole blame of the small attendance at the school is thrown on the Board, compelled us in justice to that body to clear them of such blame, and if the reputation of the school, or that of its headmaster, suffers in consequence the fault is not ours. It is best to tell the truth even though it may be unpleasant for some people to hear it.

We leave our readers to form what estimate they may of the apology Mr. Dunn offers for the small attendance at the school. To our mind it is far from satisfactory, and his statements do not accord with the figures which we gave yesterday respecting the attendance at the school some four or five years ago and the attendance now. Mr. Dunn feels particularly sore about what he calls our unseemly and ungenerous insinuations towards him in regard to the degrees he lately received from the University. It is quite excusable in Mr. Dunn to be proud of these, but it does not follow that because he places such a very high value on them as to think they give the Grammar School a "name," others should view them in the same light. We give Mr. Dunn all due credit for obtaining these honors, but we are not prepared to admit that the school has won a "name" through their being conferred on him until we see the fruits. These honors may be some indication of a teacher's learning, but they afford no evidence whatever of a teacher's talent for teaching, or of his energy and application in the discharge of his duties. There have been many successful teachers who never could boast of such handles to their name, yet their schools have ranked high among our educational institutions, and obtained a "name" of which the Guelph Grammar School cannot boast.

THE PRIVY COUNCIL.—The Privy Council met at Ottawa yesterday. The proceedings were simply of a conversational character. Mr. Rose entered into explanations with regard to his financial mission to England. Sir John told the other member how he had failed in his mission to Nova Scotia, but he thought in time the blue noses would be all right. This having been done, Mr. Higgins, of the Victoria Colonist, British Columbia, was invited into the Council Chamber, and spent about an hour in explaining the unfortunate state of matters on the Pacific coast.
