

Canada Southern Railway.
We give below a statement of the progress of work on the Canada Southern Railway up to the end of last week.

Commencing on the main line of the road, at Fort Erie, 21 miles of track is laid, and one-half of it ballasted. From St. Thomas eastward, 22 miles is laid and one-third ballasted. Westward it is laid 38 miles, and one-half ballasted. From Amherstburg eastward 40 miles is laid, a third of which is ballasted. A gap of 32 miles remains to complete the main line between St. Thomas and the Detroit River.

On the St. Clair branch of the road, which is 61 miles in length, 34 miles of track is laid, and a third of it ballasted. The work of track-laying was suspended for two weeks, so that the portion completed might be ballasted before cold weather set in. It was resumed this week, and the Chief Engineer expects to complete it along the whole line within thirty days. Ballasting work will continue steadily till finished. The winter having set in so early the road will not be opened for traffic as soon as was at one time expected.

Facilities for crossing the Detroit river will be completed by the first of January. The large ferry boat now being constructed at Windsor will be ready by that date. The engines are being put in place, and the builders are forwarding their work vigorously. This boat has a length of 248 feet and a breadth of 70 feet. It is designed to carry 21 of the largest size freight cars. The masonry of the bridge to connect Gross Isle with the American mainland is nearly completed, and this done the spans of the bridge will be erected in a few weeks.—*St. Thomas Home Journal.*
