Have Patience

The following paper, written by Mr Bert Smith was read recently at the Ep worth League meeting held in the basement of the Methodist church. Bert has been sadly afflicted for many years and has exer cised, personally, the patience which he so powerfully urges on others in the following

In our lesson the Master is teaching His disciples in all ages some of the deep things of God. In answer to Peter's question He shows us that His followers must not set limitations upon their feregoing of others faults and so try to confine within the narrow bounds of their finite conception, the spirit of love and mercy they should exer cise toward their fellowmen. To illustrate, our Lord gave this remarkable Parable showing how one who had forgiven a debt of twelve million dollars, refused to forgive his fellow the paltry sum of \$15. The terms are significent as a picture of the vast difference between the patient love of God and our highest attainmentsin the same line, which are like on a drop in the ocean. At first sight we are inclined to condemn tais unmerciful servant, but let us be careful how we criticise and rather look into our own hearts to see if we have not been guilty in some measure, of the same offence, and rest not until by true repentance we have sought God's forgive ness and permitted His spirit to cast out and destroy the evil, so that we may be able through the new Christ life within us to show the same mercy within us to show the same mercy to others. We have need of some great calamity without a murmur, because it seems inevitable; and at the same time give way to impatience in the most trivial occurrences of every day life Let us in the home, the office, the work shop, or wherever we are placed, be very careful to watch for the "little foxes" tha spoil the beauty of the vine of our life and character, and to "run with patience the race that is set before us," no matter how trying may seem the circumstances, and be patient towards all men. We have need of this virtue also in prayer and in our work in the Master's vineyard, as we must have patience with those for whom we work, with our fellow-workers and in waiting fo results as "the husbandman waiteth for the patience for it." This does not prohibit u from protesting against evil when necessary. but we must be very cautious when we are called upon to speak the truth that it b

always spoken in love. Where shall we look for the source of this law of forgiving the mistakes and sins of others? It is simply the law of cause and effect. It implies love, and God is love. Hence we look to Him as the fountain-head from whence flows this purifying stream, not only forgiving us but implanting in us the spirit of forgiving love, for Christ said "If ye forgive not men their trespasses neither will your Father forgive trespasses," showing that our sins are truly forgiven only as we become new creatures in Christ and reflect His spirit.

Speaking of Paul's analysis of Love. Henry Drummond divides it into nine clauses, and to the first one "Love suffer eth long" he gives the name of "Patience." saying "this is the normal attitude of Love. Love waiting to begin. Calm, ready to de its work when the summons comes, but meantime wearing the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit. Love suffers long; beareth all things; believeth all things; hopeth all things. For Love understands and there-fore waits." How shall we attain unto perfection in this virtue? By putting it into practice constantly. Drummond says, "What makes a man a good artist, a good musician? Practice. What makes a man within you. It is growing more beautiful, though you see it not, and every touch of temptation may add to its perfection. Be among men and among troubles, difficulties and obstacles, Goethe said, "Talent developes itself in solitude; character in the stream of life. The talent of prayer, of faith, of mediation, of seeing the unseen developes itself in solitude; character grows in the stream of the world's life. That chiefly is where men are to learn love.

In Holman Hunt's great picture called 'The shadow of death," we see Jesus in the carpenter's shop stretching himself at the close of day and the shadow of his arms forms a cross on the wall; but another feature is very suggestive. On a shelf is collection of books in the form of rolls. They represent the library Jesus used-the books of the Holy Scriptures. It suggests that in leisure moments, he turned to them to ponder their truths and store away their prin ciples in His memory and heart. So should we learn to prepare in advance for temptation by filling our hearts and minds with the truths of God's Word. When the tempter has come there is no time to search for texts, but if we have sacred words treasured in our hearts it is easy to draw them forth for use at any moment of

TALK OF BOTHA'S SURRENDER

Boer General Asked for Six Days to Considered It.

Then He Decided That He Would Resume Hostilities-Burghers Are Returning to Middleburg and Are Burning the Veldt Behind Them-Beers Have Abundant Arms and Ammuni tion and Will Fight Still.

London, June 19 .- (3 a.m.) -Lord London, June 19.—(3 a.m.)—Lord Roberts, according to a Boer despatch from Machadodorp, sent a message to Commandant-General Botha on June 13, suggesting disarmament, and complimenting the bravery of the burghers. It was pointed out that the surrender would be without dishonor to the burghers and would prevent much suffering. Gen. Botha asked for a six days' armistice in order to confer and consider. Lord Roberts consented to five days. Finally Gen. Botha declined to accept the pupposition, and hostilities were renewed. newed.

The Boer commandoes are retiring

The Boer commandoes are retiring on Middleburg, followed by the British cavalry and artillery, occasional shells reaching the rear guard. The Boers are destroying the bridges and burning the veldt behind them, carrying off provisions and cattle and leaving the country barren.

Advices from Machadodorp says that the Boers have an abundance of arms and ammunition, with dyna-

arms and ammunition, with dynamite and oxen, and that they are preparing heavy wagon trains for a retreat to the Lydenburg district, where the chiefs, notwithstuding rumors to the contrary, are determined to make a stand.
