THE WEATHER PROPHECY.
Toronto, Ont., Sept. 28—11 p.m.—A moder-
ately deep depression tonight covers Lake
Superior. Another depression is situated in
the far Northwest, and the pressure is high
over the Western States and along the
Atlantic coast. Rain has fallen generally in
Manitoba, and a moderate gale has prevailed
on Lake Superior. Elsewhere the weather has
been fine.

Minimum and maximum temperatures:
Calgary, 30°-54°; Prince Albert, 24°-36°; Qu-
Appelle, 33°-54°; Winnipeg, 41°-54°; Toronto,
61°-78°; Montreal, 60°-82°; Quebec, 55°-82°;
Halifax, 52°-70°. West winds are displayed on
the upper lakes.

Local temperatures—Highest, 81°; lowest, 70°.
Local probabilities—
Toronto, Sept. 29—1 a.m.—The indications
for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes region
covering the peninsula and as far east as
Belleville are: strong winds and moderate
gales, southerly to westerly; showers or thun-
der storms in most localities; turning cooler.

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.
—Frank Kern, of the Molsons Bank
here, is holidaying at his home near
Woodstock.

—Dr. Oronhyatekha, S. C. R. of the In-
dependent Order of Foresters, has been at
Deseronto since Thursday, on account of the
very serious illness of Miss Oronhyatekha.

—Mr. Frank Sunagan, the well-known
merchant tailor, late of this city, has been
stricken with paralysis in Toronto, and is
not expected to recover. Mr. Sunagan had
been similarly reported before, but the
attacks were slight. He recently gave up
business in London and removed with his
family to the Queen City. At present he
is in the General Hospital there.

—Mr. John Weld, of this city, left Sat-
urday afternoon for Winnipeg.

—J. Fallows, of this city, was registered
in London, Eng., a couple of weeks ago.

—The Ladies' Aid of the East London
Methodist Church cleared \$200 from their
booth at the Fair Grounds.

—Mr. Charles Standfield, late of the
Telephone Company, left last week for
Chicago. His many friends wish him every
success.

—Special reference to the Sunday school
work was made from all the Presbyterian
pulpits Sunday as decreed by the General
Assembly.

—Wm. Smith, a young man charged by
J. Sherlock, King Street, with assault and
malicious damage to property, was re-
manded until to-day at the Police Court
yesterday.

—S. R. Graham, of the Molsons Bank,
Toronto, is visiting friends in this city.
He is a brother of Principal Graham, of
Simcoe Street School, and was formerly con-
nected with the Molsons Bank here.

—Margaret Judd was dismissed by the
police magistrate yesterday on a charge
of the theft of three sheets from the City
Hospital two years ago. She denied all
knowledge of the affair, although the sheets
were found in her possession. She will
leave the city at once.

—Sen. Monaghan has been given her
liberty on condition that she leaves the
city. If found here again she will get
twelve months imprisonment. She was
arrested for keeping a disorderly house,
and as a reward for her evidence against
Esther Forsythe was dismissed with the
above proviso.

—The First Congregational Church was
crowded Sunday evening, when Sen. Grigg
spoke from the words: "Seek ye first the
kingdom of God and all these things shall
be added unto you." He dwelt on his
conversion to Christianity and on his ex-
perience preaching and following that
time. His address was practical and con-
vincing.

—Mr. Alexander Calder died at Victoria,
B. C., on Sept. 16 from the effects of
paralysis at the ripe age of 85. He was a
native of Edinburgh, Scotland, and came to
Canada twice many years ago, the second
time locating at Kingston, Ont., where he
occupied a position in the Bank of British
North America. In 1859 he removed to
British Columbia, where he was appointed
the treasurer of British Columbia, and
being stationed part of the time at Victoria
and part of the time at New Westminster.

His father died in this city in 1876 at the
age of 96. One sister and brother survive
him, one being in the State of Michi-
gan and one in Missouri.

—The 29th Battalion Band arrived home
from London Sunday night on the 9 o'clock
train. The train, however, was over an
hour late, and it was after 10 before
arriving in Berlin. The band went to
London at 8 o'clock on Tuesday morning.

were loud in their praises of the London

during their stay, and will always be glad
to go back to London. The London people

wanted them to stay another day. This

A Valuable Mare Recovered.
The valuable pacing mare taken from the
Ross House stables Saturday morning has
been recovered, and the owner, Mr. V. C.
Ross, is happy in consequence. He and
Detective Rider found the animal the same
evening on the property of Mr. John Gill,
back the way of the river. It was a dark
coloured and harness belonging to the St.
Marys men. Mr. Gill says the turnout
was left there by someone unknown. Evi-
dently the thief was afraid to complete
what he had begun.

An Effective Dose Prepared.
About 2 o'clock on Sunday morning, Dr.
McCallum heard an unusual noise at his
residence on Dundas Street, and on look-
ing out he found it was made by someone
endeavouring to gain admittance through the
side window. The doctor fired a paper
weight at the intruder and missed him, and
might have done the same with the leaden
pills which he immediately prepared, but
by the time he got his shooting iron and
commencing form downstairs his maraud-
er vanished and made his escape.

Children and Matches.
Saturday evening a number of merry
boys and girls on the commons, corner
of Wolfe and Waterloo streets, were play-
ing at "the west" with a very popu-
lar since the advent of Broncho John's com-
bination. To complete the realism the
camp fire was requisite and matches were
accordingly lighted. The whole dress of
one of the girls was ignited and soon be-
gan to blaze. George Gregory and James
Arthur, who were employed near by, saw
the affair, rushed to the spot and smothered
the flames with their coats. The
victim was rather painfully burned around
the body, but fortunately escaped without
serious injuries.

Put Out of Its Misery.
Saturday evening Mr. Sam Grigg dis-
covered two men on Fullerton Street en-
deavouring forcibly to make a miserable
looking horse rise to its feet, which it was
evidently unable to do. Mr. Grigg inter-
posed and had the animal conveyed to the
Western Hotel stables. The poor brute
was a mere bundle of bones, with skin raw
back sore, and was totally unfit for
service. It was attached to dray No. 6,
and was being driven by the owner, Joseph
Stevenson, who said he intended to proceed
seven miles that night. The animal was
cared for until yesterday, when it was chlo-
roformed by J. H. Tennant, V.S., as the most
merciful way of putting it out of misery.
Mr. Grigg acted as a conscientious member
of the London Humane Society. Any citi-
zen under whose notice cases of like cruelty
come would confer a favor on the society
by reporting the same to any of its officers.

to bed since Monday last, when he suffered
an attack of dizziness while at work in his
garden. Deceased was born on Nov. 4,
1816, at Hamilton, Lanarkshire, Scotland,
and was a son of Rev. John Moncrieff, pro-
fessor of Hebrew in the Anderson-
ian University, Glasgow. He studied
for the ministry and subsequently to his
ordination held charge as Minister of the
Edinburgh. In 1844 he retired from the
ministry and came to this country accom-
panied by his wife and son George. He
took up his residence in London, and about
Christmas of the same year. He lived here
until his death, and had been chiefly engaged
in literary pursuits. His scholastic attain-
ments were of the highest order, and he
had been formerly applied to several
pamphlets from his able pen. As a
writer he acquired merited prominence; he
not only wrote prose, but was a poet of no
mean ability. He was also an editor of
brilliant acquisitions. His speech on the
assassination of President Lincoln in April,
1865, at a mass meeting in Queen's Avenue
Edinburgh, was a powerful journal of this city.
For many years he has taken no active in-
terest in Canadian politics. He leaves
a widow and two sons—George, of Petrolia,
M.P. for East Lambton, and Walter,
manager of the Southwick Oil Company,
Kingston. The funeral takes place to-
morrow at Woodland Cemetery this afternoon.
