John Moncrieft, professor of Hobrew in the Anderson ian University, Glasgow. He studied for the ministry and subsequent to his ordination held charges at Musselburgh and Edinburgh. In 1854 he retired from the ministry and came to this country accompanied by his wife and son George. He took up his residence in London about Christmas of the same year. He lived here until his death, and had been chiefly engaged in literary pursuits. His scholastic attainuntil his death, and had been chiefly engaged in literary pursuits. His scholastic attainments were of the highest order, and have been forcibly applied to several pamphlets from his able pen. As a writer he acquired merited prominence; he not only wrote prose, but was a poet of no mean ability. He was also an orator of brilliant acquirements. His speech on the assassination of President Lincoln in April, 1865, as mass meeting in Onesn's Avenue also a contributor to religious pertoclaria, particularly of late years, among some of his works being: "Future Probation—Is That Awaiting Any of the Unrighteous?"; "Man's Only Hope of Immortality," and "Sodom, or Another Opportunity." Mr. Moncrieff was also editor of the London Daily News, a pioneer journal of this city. For many years he has taken no active in-
