A GREAT STEAMSHIP LINE.
 New York, Feb. 10.—The National Steamship Line and the Atlantic Transportation Company have united, or, rather, the former has been absorbed by the latter, and the vessels will be run under the same management from March 1. As a result the Atlantic Transport Company will control the greater part of the carrying business between United States ports and London.

Among the ships of the National Line, are the America, the Europe, the France, the Greece, the England, the Spain and the Denmark. In 1891 the company started a line of steamships between New York and London, and on this route are now the four modern steamships, the Massachusetts, the Manitoba, the Mobile and the Mohawk.

THE VENEZUELAN TROUBLE.
 London, Feb. 10.—The Daily Chronicle reiterates that it believes there is a good prospect for an honorable settlement of the Anglo-Venezuelan dispute.

THE FLYING SQUADRON.
 London, Feb. 10.—Orders will be issued to the flying squadron, which is lying off Spithead, to proceed on Monday for Ireland, Bantry Bay, south coast of Ireland, and there await further orders.

THE RADICALS.
 The Radical members of the House of Commons will on Monday night dine separate from the Liberals. Sir Charles Dilke, Mr. Henry Labouchere and the Hon. F. J. Stanhope propose to run the Radical machine, with Mr. Herbert Gladstone as the nominal leader.

BARATIERI WANTS MORE MEN.
 Rome, Feb. 10.—It is stated that Gen. Baratieri, commander of the Italian forces now operating in Abyssinia, has decided to increase the immediate dispatch of twelve battalions of infantry, six mounted batteries, and 2,500 mules. The Cabinet has discussed the request, and Prime Minister Crispi has had an interview with King Humbert on the subject.

KRUGER COMING.
 Johannesburg, Feb. 10.—The Standard of this city says that President Kruger will go to England in response to the invitation extended to him by Rt. Hon. Jos. Chamberlain, British Colonial Secretary, to visit London for the purpose of discussing the questions arising from the raid of Dr. Jameson.

CUBAN LOSSES.
 Havana, Feb. 10.—It is stated that the insurgent loss at the battle of Sorel was 800.

When Canellas arrived to relieve the garrison of Candalaria, and the troops entered the town, after routing the insurgents, they were greeted with enthusiastic acclamations. Gen. Canellas was lifted upon the arms of the people and carried through the streets. Reports say the loss of the insurgents exceeded 250.

RHODES GONE HOME.
 London, Feb. 10.—Hon. Cecil Rhodes, formerly Premier of Cape Colony, started for Bulawayo this morning. Mr. Rhodes' departure was managed very quietly. He will go to South Africa via the Suez Canal. The Duke of Abercorn, president of the British Chartered South Africa Company, and a few friends were the only people who saw Mr. Rhodes off. It is understood that he will return to England for the trial of Dr. Jameson, which will take place in June next.

THE TRANSVAAL PRISONERS.
 Pretoria, Feb. 10.—At the trial of the prisoners, Police Commandant Schutte, deposed that the Government withdrew the police from Johannesburg on Dec. 27 in order to avoid a collision with the rebels. Other witnesses deposed that the rebels were armed and drilled, and that earthworks were formed around the city. When the news of Dr. Jameson's march was received the officers of the National Guard denied any knowledge of the affair.

OF NO IMPORTANCE.
 Madrid, Feb. 10.—The Government organ regrets the resolutions of the United States Senate Committee on Foreign Relations in favor of the recognition of the Cuban insurgents as belligerents as being of no importance. They declare that the relations between the Spanish and the American Governments are very cordial, and that the campaign in Cuba has not changed them. Marshal Martinez de Campos dined last evening with the Queen Regent.

SEXTON IS NOT AMBITIOUS.
 Dublin, Feb. 10.—Saturday's meeting of the Irish Parliamentary party was conducted with closed doors. A deputation was appointed to wait upon Mr. Thomas Sexton, Anti-Parnellite, with instructions to ask him to accept the chairmanship of the party, in succession to Mr. Justin McCarthy, reported that Mr. Sexton is not willing to accept. He promised the deputation, however, to give the matter careful consideration, and said that he would communicate to them his decision in a few days. The meeting then adjourned until Feb. 18.

SETTLED OUT OF COURT.
 London, Feb. 10.—The suit of Birdie Sutherland, a well-known member of the ballet, against the Hon. Dudley Churchill Majoribanks, eldest son of Baron Tweedmouth and a lieutenant in the Fourth Battalion of the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders, claiming damages for breach of promise of marriage, which was to have been tried today before Judge Russell and a special jury, has been settled out of court. Miss Sutherland, who had previously refused \$3,000 to settle the case, has withdrawn her suit upon the payment of £5,000. A large crowd had gathered in and about the court room, where another case was proceeding, in anticipation of hearing what was looked upon as likely to be a celebrated theatrical case. But to their disgust the case being tried was suddenly interrupted, as Miss Sutherland and her lawyer held a short conversation in a low tone with Judge Russell, after which the latter announced that Sutherland had been called to the bar and allowed costs.

CURIOUS CAUSE FOR REBELLION.
 Strange news comes from Corea. The king has ordered the sacrifice of his own and those of his court out of. There ensued the greatest consternation. The Minister of Education and other officials at once resigned. Constables were posted at the gates of the capital to capture all visiting country people and trotted their prisoners to the waiting barbers. In the rural districts the people are in rebellion, and local governors are resigning. Hundreds of people have fled to the mountains and many are under arms. The Formosa rebellion is still unchecked.

LOYAL CANADA.
 London, Feb. 10.—Discussing the loyalty resolution passed by the Canadian House of Commons, the St. James' Gazette says: "Such an expression of loyalty to the mother country is extremely grateful to us at the present juncture."

The Globe trusts that the people of the United States will not consider the United States as framed in a spirit unfriendly to them, and adds: "The time is auspicious for a closer relationship between every section of the Anglo-Saxon race. If the United States is the 'Greater Britain' that should not be, it is not a source of jealousy on our part. We should not forget that we are all members of one family."

RUSSIA AND BULGARIA.
 St. Petersburg, Feb. 10.—The warmth of the dispatch published in the morning official papers on the Bulgarian question came as a surprise to the diplomatic world here, which has refused obstinately until last month to believe that Russia would go so far and pardon so thoroughly. A person in the highest position said: "It is the greatest triumph for Russia how she has been able to exercise the advantage of waiting. Russia generally will wait with delight. Now is the time to wait. It is understood that the letter carried by Gen. Koutousoff contains what may be termed a ukase of the Czar to the Bulgarian people."

A special despatch to the Novoe Vremya from Sofia describes the immense preparations being made in the palace. There has been a family drama. The princess is in despair. The Czar says: "I will not enter upon a procedure—an assembly of the people to again recognize Ferdinand. Now the question is whether the powers will recognize him. Austria seems glad; we would rather not hear that it would be more sincere. Russia does not wish to interfere with the liberty of the Balkan countries or states created by her exploits, but the countries must not forget the duties which they owe, the first of which is not to enter the ranks of her enemies."

RHODES' LATEST SCHEME.
 London, Feb. 10.—The Times has an article this morning on the plans of Hon. Cecil Rhodes in South Africa, of which it says: "The first chapter in the scheme is the creation under a British administration of a British Johannesburg in Rhodesia. Mr. Rhodes believes that the immense wealth of Rhodesia justifies a reasonable hope that within five years the population of Rhodesia will exceed that of the existing Uitlander population of the Transvaal. In addition to the splendid climatic advantages, he believes that the plateaus of Mashonaland and Matabeleland are highly mineralized. Coals exists in enormous quantities, and it is supposed that there is a large amount of undeveloped land. Mr. Rhodes' project includes an intention to lead the way by putting the bulk of his own large fortune into the local enterprises, and also to encourage the cultivation of wool, coffee, rice, and other tropical crops."

There has been nothing eventful in theatrical circles during the past week, but business has been good. Advice from Biarritz says that Mr. Gladstone has been enjoying perfect health. He goes to Cannes on Monday. Mr. Gladstone has been engaged daily in literary work.

The six leading theaters closed on Wednesday evening last as a mark of respect to the royal family, who were at Osborne attending the funeral of Prince Henry of Battenberg.

The Central Agricultural Association of Brussels has presented a petition to Parliament in favor of bimetallicism and begging the Government to bring the matter to the notice of the foreign Governments.

HAD A TOOTH IN HER LUNG.
 Elizabeth, N. J., Feb. 10.—During an unusually severe fit of coughing, Mrs. Patrick Pierson, of this city, raised a tooth. The molar came from her lungs, where it had been lodged for exactly three months, and had nearly caused her death. Three months ago Mrs. Pierson went to a dentist to have a large back tooth pulled. She took gas, and the belief was that when the dentist pulled the tooth he dropped it into her throat and she drew it into her lungs during spasmodic gasping. She was afflicted with a cough from the time the tooth was pulled, and, although treated by many physicians, she failed to improve, and was in a dying condition when she coughed up the tooth. Mrs. Pierson began almost immediately to recover, and no doubt is entertained now of her recovery.

House and Lobby.

Premier Bowell Likely to Refuse to Give Up to Tupper.

A Caucus of the Conservative Party Called for Tomorrow.

The Fate of the Bill Dealing With Manitoba Schools.

Madame Laurier's Victory—The Flight of a Violent Preacher—Electric Railway and Steam Railway Crossings.

Ottawa, Feb. 10.—Tomorrow, at 11, a Conservative caucus has been called. It will be the first general caucus of the party as represented in Parliament since it became a certainty that the bill to meddle with the Manitoba school question would be introduced into Parliament. It will also be the first assembly of that nature since the question of leadership became one of public discussion. The intention of the bosses was to do without a caucus till towards the end of the session, but in response to pressure, Premier Bowell was determined to overrule the desires of his antagonistic colleagues, whose conduct recently moved him to call them "a nest of traitors," and accordingly both the leadership and the school bill will be discussed in caucus. A lively time is expected.

A Conservative M.P. says: "Although Sir Charles Tupper's success in Cape Breton is regarded as satisfactory, it does not allay the apprehension felt here amongst the knowing ones as to the future. There is a deep-seated belief that Sir Mackenzie Bowell has no intention of relinquishing the leadership, and that there will be an unpleasant time when the Conservative party in caucus assemblies."

Sir Charles Tupper was given a demonstration by the Conservatives of Montreal. He is expected here today.

A dispatch from North Sydney, Cape Breton, says that the congregation of the leading Presbyterian church there have almost boycotted the minister, Rev. Dr. Murray, because of his effusive welcome to Sir Charles Tupper and his offensive partisanship.

A well-known politician said to the Toronto World (Conservative) correspondent on Saturday night: "This is the 5th day of February. Parliament is believed, expires by effluxion of time on April 25. Between these dates there are 76 days. Deducting Saturdays and Sundays, there are 58 days left for actual work. Other ten days must be allowed as private members' days. In the 46 days left to the Government they hope to put through the Remedial Bill and the Supply Bill, the two measures in which they have a vital interest. The opposition to the school bill is so pronounced that I do not believe that that measure can be got through in that time. Mr. McCarthy, Mr. O'Brien, Mr. Wallace, Prof. Weldon and others will oppose it at every stage. Major Hughes has also made a similar declaration. If this is so, they can take up many days in talking against the bill on its general principles, and against every clause in it. They say they will never let it out of committee. In regard to the supplies, the Opposition have, it is believed, determined to fight very item and prevent any sum, big or little, being voted. They have declared that if the Government got a supply bill through, they need not go to the country until March, 1897, and they intend to run no such risk."

An exceedingly interesting progressive euchre party was given by Mrs. McCarthy, daughter of Sir Mackenzie Bowell, on Friday afternoon. Thirty-six ladies participated in the contest, and at the close of the keen competition it was found that Madame Laurier had won the first prize, consisting of a richly-enamelled souvenir spoon.

A dispatch from Winnipeg says that the re-count of the votes cast in Dauphin in the late provincial election confirmed the return of Theodore Burrows (Liberal) by 12 majority.

At a meeting of the railway committee of the Privy Council on Saturday, Mr. Wm. Laidlaw, Q.C., of Toronto, was present to oppose an application preferred by the C. P. R. and G. T. R. to secure a revision of the order made by the committee some months ago, directing that the two railway companies should pay the cost of working certain semaphore signals, gates, derrails, or Scotch blocks, at the crossings of the Toronto street railway over these steam roads. The two railway companies contend that they are paying more than their due share of the protection, owing to the omission of a clause in the formal order made by the committee. They say that it is only fair to require them to pay no more than what they were accustomed to before the order was issued. The original argument and the decision will be looked up.

In his recent speech on the budget, Mr. Patterson, the member for South Brant, referring to the assertions of the high tax leaders that England was being ruined by free trade and that she would have to adopt protection to preserve her commerce—asked the farmers of Canada to consider what the policy that Dr. Montague, Sir Hibbert Tupper and others are inviting them to adopt, meant to them. It would be a dire disaster to Canada if British statesmen adopted the view of the Canadian Conservative leaders that the only salvation for their trade. How would it suit Canada if Great Britain took Sir H. Tupper's advice and imposed four cents a pound on cheese, and three cents a pound on butter and 20 per cent on cattle? Already this sea-

When the Minister of Agriculture had asserted in this House that the embargo in Britain against our live cattle was maintained because the British Government desired to protect the agriculturists of Great Britain against Canada. How then could Sir Hibbert Tupper or any member of the Government object when they declared England was suffering for want of this valuable system of protection in vogue in Canada? What did all this and so on? It tended to the closing of the one free market the Canadian people had for their products. Mr. Patterson quoted the Liberal resolution moved a few sessions ago by Mr. Davies in favor of reducing the duties on British goods and asked Canada to mark that the Government and every one of their supporters voted that resolution. This Liberal government, I said, British goods ten per cent higher last year than American goods, they refused to give even fair play to the mother country which admitted our goods free.

In Guy's Hospital, London—Part of a Knife Removed from a Sailor's Body.

Paris, Feb. 10.—Some remarkable results have been obtained in photography through opaque bodies by means of Roentgen's rays. M. Ewald has asked if it will be possible to photograph through such parts of the body as the thigh of M. Neuhaus replies that the rays would pass through the muscles just as one's sight passes through a sheet of glass.

Up to the present the most wonderful cure made of this discovery is reported in the Lancet. A sailor who was brought to Guy's Hospital, London, has been completely cured of paralysis. When admitted he was dead drunk, and has been found in a very dangerous condition in one of the worst quarters of London.

As soon as his drunken fit was over it was discovered that he was paralyzed in the upper and lower parts of his body. The most minute examination could reveal nothing but a small wound in his back by the side of the vertebral column, which in a few days was healed.

During this time, and despite all medicine, the man remained paralyzed. Then Dr. Williamson was struck with the idea of employing the new photographic discovery. A photograph, following Prof. Roentgen's system, was taken of the man's wound.

The negative showed the presence of a foreign body, the nature of which could not be determined, between the first dorsal vertebra and the first lumbar vertebra. An incision was made at this place, and, after a great deal of difficulty, the blade of a knife was taken out.

The patient immediately improved. According to The Times, the needle has been extracted in a similar manner from the hand of a child at Berne. In another hospital of the same town, Dr. Defontaine, of Paris, has taken a photograph of a fractured leg.

In another instance a photograph was taken at Vienna of a piece of glass which had been in a glass-worker's hand for several years.

SCHOONERS ASHORE.

Two Vessels Come to Grief on the Massachusetts Coast—Several Lives Lost.

Newburyport, Mass., Feb. 10.—A three-masted schooner, supposed to be the Florida, of New York, went ashore yesterday afternoon on Salisbury Beach. When first observed seven men were seen on the schooner. They attempted to launch the yawl boat, but it was smashed to pieces in the terrible seas. The men then took to the rigging and lashed themselves to the main and mizzen masts. It was shortly after 5 o'clock when the life-savers started to throw a life-line to the ill-fated vessel, but owing to the darkness and the heavy wind no definite aim could be taken. About 9 o'clock one body was washed ashore, and shortly afterwards a second body was observed in the surf.

The British schooner Allianza, from New York, for St. Johns, Nfld., went ashore at Plum Island about 7 o'clock last night and is a total wreck. Three of the crew of seven, including the captain, were drowned. The life-saving crew at Plum Island had gone to Salisbury Beach, and the unfortunate crew attempted to reach shore on the wreckage, four of them being successful.
