Our advices by private letter from Liverpool refer to the great increase that is being made in the sale of Canadian bacon, not only in the large centers, but in the provincial towns and country districts, and is known as Canadian pea-fed; and so much is it liked that certain lean brands have sold as high as 54s and 56s, or as much as Danish brands will bring. This speaks volumes for our export bacon trade, which promises to develop into a very important one. It seems that the most favored brands of Canadian bacon in England are lean, although medium fat cuts are also appreciated.
