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CONCISE CULLINGS.

The safe of the New York and New England Railroad Company at Haverhill, N. Y., was broken open before daylight Sunday morning and robbed of \$225 in money and \$4,000 worth of certificates.

The report of a race war on the sheep range southwest of Cerrillos, N. M., has been confirmed. Five white and nineteen Mexican men are reported to have been killed, and further trouble is anticipated.

TRAGEDY AT GRAND RAPIDS. The Disturbance of a Man's Home Shot Dead.

GRAND RAPIDS, Dec. 24.—John G. Wetherham, of this city, last night shot and instantly killed John Eikman, aged 22. Wetherham, nine years ago, married a girl several years younger than himself and very pretty. Three months since Eikman met the woman, fell violently in love with her and continued to force his calls upon her during her husband's absence. Yesterday afternoon he called and informed Mrs. Wetherham that he would come to the house to-night and shoot every member of the family. This evening he appeared with a revolver and shot Wetherham heavily loaded, and after trying to force the door of the Wetherham home went around to the rear entrance and attempted to force his way. Here he was met by Wetherham, who leveled a shot gun and shot the intruder dead.

PRISONERS SENTENCED. White Gets Two Years and Gregory Eighteen Months.

SANDWICH, Dec. 24.—Judge Henry Satterly sentenced the prisoners who have been convicted at the county court sitting just closed. The first one called up was Henry E. White, the defaulting secretary-treasurer of the Walker's millable iron works, who was convicted on two indictments and acquitted on five. As White stood up in the box to receive his sentence it is safe to say that there was not a person in the room but who felt sorry for the gray-haired prisoner and sympathized with his unfortunate wife. The judge, anxious to get through as soon as possible, in a few words alluded to the letters he had received from a number of prominent people in White's behalf, and then sentenced him to two years in the Kingston penitentiary. The words had hardly left the judge's mouth when Mrs. White ran to where her husband was and, throwing her arms around his neck, cried until there were few dry eyes in the court room. White was broken hearted, and wife and husband, guarded by a deputy sheriff, left the court room.

Charles Gregory, who was convicted of bigamy, got eighteen months in the Central Prison; Isaac Lair, for perjury, 23 months; Joseph Hall, for theft, one year; and August Hebert, for stealing a pocketbook, 30 days.
