

BOER STORY OF THE MAGERS-FONTEIN FIGHT

Pretoria, Tuesday, Dec. 12.-The folowing official announcement has been made: "Gen. Cronie reports that on yesterday there was desultory fighting till six, when heavy cannon fire was resumed. The Scandinavians stormed a difficult position, but it became untenable, and they suffered severely. I was unable to send help. The British were in overwhelming force, but must have had at least 2,000 men put out of action either in killed or wounded."

Another official report from Capt. Finhart says: "There were no signs of surrender, the burghers fighting with conspicuous bravery, and maintaining their positions under heavy British fire. Our cannon were of very little use."
Pretoria, Tuesday, Dec. 12.—The British were greatly assisted by balloons. Twenty-four ambulances were working backward and forward between the fighting line and the enemy's camp.
