Burglars Who Have Been Operating in Canada Nabbed in Chicago.

Toronto, June 2.—The daring burglars who tried to break open the Standard Bank in Parkdale, who made a big haul at Aurora, and who tried to break into the bank at London, are under arrest in Chicago. Detective Inspector Stark has received the following message from the Chicago chief of police: "Have arrested Frank Rutledge, alias Dyer. He has in his possession \$346. Also a man answering the description of No. 3 in your letter. Gives name of Fred Harris; about 27 years old, has \$204. Also No. 4, who gives the name of Jones; about six feet tall. All well armed. Have all their baggage. Am waiting orders. Wire at once." (Signed) Joseph Kipley, Chief of Police. "An officer will leave at once to bring the men back."

DR. BEN-OLIEL DEAD

For Many Years He Was a Missionary in Palestine.

Ann Arbor, Mich., June 2.—The death of Rev. Abraham Ben-Oliel occurred Thursday night. He was a Jew and had been trained to become a rabbi in the Jewish church. When he was converted to Christianity at the age of 18, he went to London where he was ordained a Christian minister by twelve ministers, representing five denominations. He had spent a half-century as a missionary in Palestine and among the Jewish people. Dr. Ben-Oliel first went to Jerusalem as a missionary of the Free Kirk of Scotland. A few years ago he became a Baptist. Latterly he gave up his work in Jerusalem for lack of funds, it is alleged.

FAMILY POISONED.

Hamilton, June 2.—The members of the family of Mr. Wm. Cope, marble polisher, Prospect street, East Hamilton, had a narrow escape a day or two ago. After partaking of rhubarb grown in their own garden, they became sick. Dr. Husband was called in and found the younger members quite dangerously ill, and the older ones not so bad. All were apparently suffering from the effects of an irritant poison, having eaten of rhubarb and rhubarb leaves. Fortunately all recovered. Dr. Husband found it hard to trace the cause, but discovered at last that the rhubarb grew under fruit trees that had been sprinkled with paris green about a week before. The rhubarb contained enough of the poison to make it dangerous. The case should be a warning to those who grow table stuff under fruit trees.

FIVE KILLED.

Marletta, O., June 2.—By premature explosion of nitroglycerine on Thursday night at the Kelly oil well, five persons were killed, and five were hurt. The dead are: William Watson, Thomas Daniels, H. Spears, W. Carpenter, W. Spears, all farmers. J. Spears was fatally hurt.

BIKER BADLY HURT.

Brantford, Ont., June 2.—Yesterday Fred Correy and a number of others were speeding on a bicycle and motor car on Murray street to their dinner. When at the corner of Murray and Colborne streets No. 1 Mohawk Park trolley car came along. The wheelmen did not notice the car in time to slacken up. The two outsiders managed to get right and left and clear themselves of the car, but Correy ran into the trolley car and was knocked over and badly hurt. He was removed to the hospital for examination.

GASH PROVED FATAL.

Brockville, Ont., June 2.—Coleman Wilkie, who attempted to suicide about a year ago, while staying with friends at Athens, died in that village yesterday from the effects of a gash inflicted on his throat with a penknife. He was one of the oldest residents of this district and leaves a large family.

Duncan H. McIntyre, postmaster at New Glasgow, died Tuesday, aged 62 years.

It is said that a branch of the Molsons Bank will be established in Dutton.

F. H. Rohleder, barrister, of Berlin, has been appointed clerk of the division court there.

Over \$44 was realized from the enjoyable concert given last week in the Hubrey school in aid of the India famine fund.

J. Millen, G. T. R., has been appointed road master between Port Huron and Lansing, with headquarters at Port Huron.

The Ingersoll Silica-Barytic Company have been awarded a contract for laying walks around the M. C. R. premises at Clifton.

Mr. B. Douglas, lineman for the Bell Telephone Company at the Guelph office, has been appointed manager of the company's office at Niagara Falls.

Albert Holden, a farmer, aged 25, son of Mrs. Chas. Holden, living on the Holden road, Sandwich South, was fatally injured by the accidental discharge of his gun.

The Red Cross concert in the opera house, Windsor, netted \$83, which, with the \$50 donated by the diamond jubilee celebration committee of Walkerville, will be sent to Col. Otter.

Samuel Sloan, one of Harwich's oldest and best known residents, died Thursday. He lived on the fifth concession of that township. Deceased had been ailing for over two years.

The proposed bylaw to grant a bonus of \$21,000 towards the construction of the Dover, Brantford, Galt and Port Dover Electric Railway, was carried by a vote of 728 for and 193 against.

Charles Fothergill, of the Sarnia branch of the Bank of Montreal, has been transferred to Wallaceburg, where he will act as accountant. Mr. Fothergill, of Wallaceburg, will go to the Sarnia branch as acting accountant.

A change may be made in the R. C. church at McGregor. Rev. Fr. Renaud, of Detroit, but formerly of Amherstburg, it is said, will succeed Rev. Fr. Bechard, who will be appointed to another parish.

Judgment for plaintiff for \$480, the full amount of its claim, and costs, was given by Judge Ferguson at Windsor in the case of the Windsor Driving Park Association vs. the Highland Park Club, to recover balance of rent of the driving park.

John Bollison, city clerk of St. Catharines, has died of Bright's disease. He was a native of Edinburgh, Scotland. In December, 1888, he was appointed city clerk of St. Catharines. He was 67 years of age, and leaves six daughters and three sons.

Michael Quinlan, an employee of John Gibb, who has the contract for erecting King's wharf, Sarnia, met with a painful accident on Thursday. He was working at the pile-driver, when a piece of timber fell, striking him on the head and cutting a very severe gash.

The Baptist Church of Barrie extended an invitation to Rev. D. B. Harkness, B.A., to become their pastor. Mr. Harkness accepted the call, and will preach his inaugural sermon on Sunday, June 10. The new pastor is a native of Sarnia, and a graduate of McMaster University.

Under the will of the late Alexander Cameron, Windsor, the three children of his daughter, Mrs. Cartwright, were each to receive \$60,000 or \$70,000. Their deceased father left them an additional \$100,000. A cablegram has been received that Mrs. Cartwright has died. Chancellor Boyd made an order allowing \$800 to bring these "children of fortune" out to Canada.

At the Elgin non-jury assizes the case of O'Brien vs. Malahide was postponed until next assizes, the defendants pay costs of the delay. It is an action brought by F. and H. O'Brien to recover \$5,000 damages for injuries received by being thrown from a rig while riding along the highway in Malahide. The case of William Reece vs. Martha Best was dismissed with costs. The counter claim of \$15, together with costs was allowed. J. R. Watson vs. the Township of Dunwich was dismissed. It was an action for \$10,000 damages on behalf of plaintiff to restrain the township from proceeding with the construction of government drain No. 1.

ARTISTIC AND LUXURIANT

Are the New Offices of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company at Liverpool.

Liverpool Journal of Commerce: Another instance of the enterprise which characterizes the great trans-American railway move, familiarly known as the C. P. R., is afforded in this company's offices in Liverpool. The head agency for Europe is, of course, in London. But as Liverpool is the principal Canadian port it follows that the local office of the railway is second only in importance to that presided over by Mr. Archer Baker, the European traffic manager. The Liverpool interests of the Canadian Pacific Railway are in the capable hands of Mr. J. J. Gilbertson, a gentleman prominently identified with all Canadian trade matters both on this and the other side of the Atlantic. For some time past it has been felt that the Liverpool office has been altogether too small for the increased volume of passenger travel which is booked to points on the C. P. R. via Liverpool. Larger offices were accordingly resolved upon, and no expense has been spared in making the C. P. R. offices, No. 9 James street, to be known as Canadian Buildings, thoroughly typical of the luxury and enterprise which is characteristic of the whole Canadian Pacific Railway system. The work was entrusted to a well-known firm of office specialists, of Liverpool, with results which reflect the greatest credit upon all concerned. The outer office is in the Elizabethan style, with pale figured fumed oak wainscot, while the walls are covered with steel stamped paper of chaste renaissance pattern, in old ivory tones, and surmounted by a handsome frieze of somewhat warmer shade. The ceiling is in low relief plaster work, and from it are suspended eighteen electric lights. The counter is of the standard C. P. R. type, with solid West African mahogany top, the supporting oak being richly carved and delicately fluted, while the desks, which are surmounted by brass rails, are also of mahogany, and the ends of oak with beveled glass, the oak being similar to the wainscot. Inset in the counter and glazed with plate-glass is a map of the C. P. R. system, so that, including the travel desks, can see exactly the location of their destination and the route to be followed. The screen which separates the outer from the inner office is of pale fumed oak, with carved and turned pillars, and headed cathedral glass. The private office is quite an apartment de luxe in ivory white, and here and in the outer office are hung some magnificent views of the natural mountain scenery, and canon scenery through which the C. P. R. system runs. The external appearance of the office is quite in keeping with the tastefulness of the interior decorations. The plate-glass window is one of the largest in Liverpool, and is framed in oak and between it and the curtain of old gold which shuts it from the outer office are displayed samples of Canadian produce and pictures of Dominion scenery, etc. The entrance hall is paneled in gray granite, and the floor is of rich mahogany. The basement is used for stores and parcels, and is reached by a separate entrance at the back of the premises. It is paved with wood blocks, lighted with electricity, and provided with hydraulic lift. Altogether this magnificent suite of offices is quite in keeping with the high-class character of Canadian Pacific Railway arrangements in general, and reflect the highest credit upon the taste and taste displayed by the firm entrusted with the work of carrying out Mr. Gilbertson's designs. The erection of so artistic a suite of offices should go far to removing the blot which is supposed by many to rest upon the mightiest port in the world, and here the commercial spirit predominates to so large an extent that there is neither time nor money for the artistic. Numerous instances there are that go to show that in our public buildings and in the interior of our homes the opposite is the case, and that regard is paid to the artistic and luxuriant.
