AN INTERPRETER.

On Joshua Nicholas being called to
the stand, Washington Dostaxator was
sworn in as interpreter.

Mr. Faulds said he objected to the
employment of Washington Dostaxator
as an interpreter, as he believed Dostaxator
had been looking up evidence on the
crown's behalf.

Mr. Clute said that he had been in-
formed by Crown Attorney Magee that
Dostaxator had not been employed in
any capacity by the crown.

Mr. Faulds asked that Mrs. Antone,
one of the witnesses for the defense,
be called in to act as a check on Dostaxator's
interpretation. She had acted as
interpreter for the crown at both
the inquest and the preliminary ex-
amination.

Mr. Clute objected that Mrs. Antone
had been employed by the de-
fense in serving witnesses and look-
ing up evidence.

Judge Lount considered that Dostaxator
was a competent interpreter,
while he also held that Mrs. Antone,
as a witness, could not be admitted
to the room.

Nicholas testified to being at Spring-
bank with several other Indian boys
on the night of June 21. They all
went to Sharkey's hotel, where one of
the men on the veranda got a bottle
of whiskey for an Indian in the party.

A man, whom witness identified as the
prisoner, came and took witness's
bicycle, rode away on it and then
came back. He gave witness the
bicycle and then told him to get out
and go home.

The remainder of
Nicholas' evidence and his cross-ex-
amination was not of a strikingly im-
portant nature.

Augustus Dostaxator, a young In-
dian, who did not seem to understand
English any too well, was next called.
He was with the previous witness and
other Indian boys at Sharkey's. He
saw a big man with red hair get on
Nicholas' wheel. Another man at the
hotel gave Jacob Ireland a parcel.

Witness afterwards had a drink of
whisky from the bottle in the parcel.
