TONS OF STEEL RAILS

TURNED OUT AT "500"

Getting Out 500 a Day—Plant Has Capacity for 1,000.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, June 9.—F. H. Clergue, of Sault Ste. Marie, is in the city today. He says that the work of turning out steel rails has actively been commenced at the "500," and that they are turning out 500 tons a day. The capacity of the plant is 1,000 tons.

GREETINGS TO GENERAL DEWET

Thanksgiving for Peace at Pretoria—Americans in a Commando—Canadian Casualties.

London, June 10.—South African dispatches state that Gen. Elliot is accompanying Gen. Dewet through the Orange River Colony, and that they have been successful in getting the Boers to disarm. There is an absence of boasting or bitterness on either side. Thanksgiving services are being held everywhere. A party of 50 combatants who surrendered at Balmoral, in the Transvaal, included four Americans, who were granted free passage to Delagoa Bay.

The members who attended the annual dinner of the Imperial Yeomanry Field Hospital sent a telegram to Gen. Christiaan Dewet, saying: "We send you hearty greetings and best wishes on the anniversary."

THANKSGIVING.

Pretoria, June 10.—The service of thanksgiving for the return of peace was held in the principal square of Pretoria Sunday. The sun shone brilliantly, and the sight was most impressive. Outside of the rope inclosure for the troops were gathered many thousands of the townspeople and a goodly sprinkling of Boers, whose demeanor was most respectful.

The Archbishop of Cape Town officiated at the service, and Lord Kitchener, Gen. Baden-Powell and Lady Methuen and other prominent persons were present.

BOERS WILL BE LOYAL BRITISH SUBJECTS.

A special to the Times from Leeuwspruit says Gen. Hamilton addressed three hundred Boers of Britz's commando, who surrendered on Friday. He expressed the conviction that the Boers would make loyal British subjects. The Boers heard him with marked cordiality and cheered heartily.

CANADIAN CASUALTIES.

Ottawa, June 10.—The casualty department has sent the following cable to the governor-general: "Cape Town, June 6.—Following deaths are reported: June 8.—At sea, on board Cestrian, Third Canadian Mounted Rifles, John James Woodmore, enteric fever. June 5.—At Elandsfontein, Second C. M. R. 465, Stanley Bamfield, enteric fever. Woodmore's death is the second reported on the Cestrian. Pte. Higgins having been reported the day the ship reached Cape Town."

"Cape Town, June 8.—Dangerously ill. June 7. Elandsfontein. Second C. M. R. 723, Clement Guest, Rossland; 205, Wm. Bell, Hamilton; 632, Harry Hyde, Charlottetown. All enteric fever."

"Cape Town, June 9.—Death from enteric fever, June 8, Klerksdorp. Canadian Army Medical staff, attached 10th Canadian Field Hospital, 68, Nelson. Pte. Price, 6th Canadian Mounted Rifles, died of enteric fever, June 8. Charles McVicar, London; Richard Ployer, Quebec; both of Second C. M. R. and both enteric fever."

Nelson's price, reported as not appearing on the nominal roll, does not appear on the nominal roll, but the name of George Orle Price, of St. John, N. B., appears as connected with the medical hospital corps.

EAST HASTINGS.

Belleville, Ont., June 10.—The East Hastings recount, which began yesterday, but not concluded. No irregularities were found in this riding. The returning officer gave Russell (Lib.) 53 majority.

HALTON.

Milton, Ont., June 9.—The recount of the votes in Halton commenced here on Saturday before Judge Gorham, and concluded today. The result was as follows: Barber (Lib.), 3,270; Nixon (Con.), 3,248. This gives Mr. Barber a majority of 22—a gain of 8 over previous count. The ballots marked with blue pencil were five in number and were all counted for Dr. Nixon.

TWO RECOUNTS.

Owen Sound, Ont., June 9.—After the declaration of Returning Officer McKnight on Friday, the Liberals applied for a recount before Judge Morrison at once set Tuesday as the day for the recount. The Conservatives applied to Judge Cressor, senior judge, for a recount, and he set Friday as the day for running up the ballots.
