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Real Estaters Again Discuss Hospital Expenditures Were Criticized

The C ommittee Will Endeavor to Probe the Accounts.

The members of the Real Estate Owners' Association were out in force last night to discuss matters pertaining to Victoria Hospital, and after considering all the facts and figures presented during the week in The Advertiser, and a number of others which they have gathered for themselves, a committee was appointed which will hold a special meeting on Wednesday evening and decide what course of action will be followed.

Visit the Hospital.

The opinion was unanimous that the committee should visit the hospital and look over the items of expenditure, as it is felt that at the present rate of increase it is a very serious matter. One member made the statement that he had been informed by a physician that every year hundreds of dollars' worth of expensive proprietary medicines are given away to patients at Victoria Hospital which no doctor would think of prescribing for his own patients.

Alleged Falling Off.

The statement was also made that last year only about 1,800 patients were being treated, as compared with 2,000 five years ago. Yet the cost now is nearly fifty per cent greater than it was then. The action of the trust in building such large and expensive new buildings without consulting the members of the medical profession, who have repeatedly declared that they were not needed, was strongly condemned. Such buildings, it was pointed out, were going to cost a very large amount of money to maintain, and added to the present rapidly increasing expenditures, will soon become a burden that will be intolerable.

To Change Government.

The question of asking the council to take the matter out of the hands

of the trust and administer it as it was in the past was mentioned, but before passing any resolution to be sent to the council, the association felt that they will learn much by going and investigating the matter for themselves and finding out if possible where the trouble is.

The Maintenance.

Several members stated that they had been going into the figures of maintenance as given in The Advertiser, and had found that tenders were called for only in a few instances. This, it was thought, was illegal, as all expenditures of any importance are by law to be called for by tender.

Resolution Re Printing.

The following resolution was passed in regard to the supplies of printing: "Resolved, that this association, having learned from a reliable source, that supplies of printing, stationery, and so forth, have been procured without tender by those in authority at Victoria Hospital, we deprecate such procedure and suggest that in future the trust should adopt a more businesslike method in the disposal of public funds."

\$3,000 Written Off?

The statement was made that nearly \$3,000 had been written off the accounts as uncollectable. Much of this money, it was thought, could, if the matter were placed in proper hands, be collected, and the suggestion was made that City Auditor Jewell should be allowed to take the matter up with full power.

Independent Phones.

The question of independent telephones was also discussed briefly, and the general opinion prevailed that it would be in the interests of the city to have more than one telephone company. It was pointed out that in a number of Canadian and American cities telephones were far cheaper than in London.

Competition, it was shown, invariably resulted in cheapening things, and the instance was cited of what happened in towns only having one line of railway, or telegraph station or any other single public utility.
