MIRACULOUS ESCAPE

Ran to Back of Hotel, Kicked Out Window, and Gained the Ground Over the Roof of a Shed.

"If I had awakened five minutes later than I did I would never have found my way out of that hotel. As it is, I probably owe my life to the fact that I was a light sleeper, and awakened as soon as there was any noise." Mr. J. L. Johnson, of Princess avenue, who had a remarkably close call from losing his life in the fire which Adam B. Wilson, of West London, destroyed the Rossmore House at Cornwall last Friday, made the above statement to The Advertiser last night shortly after his arrival home.

"I was fortunate right through," he continued. "I arrived in Montreal early in the week, and after completing my business there went to the depot, intending to take the 7:30 evening train for Cornwall.

A Fortunate Circumstance. "I could not find my order book, and had left it there. I found that I had the book with me all right and left for Cornwall on the 10:30 train and arved there at 12:30.

"This was a fortunate circumstance, as I would almost certainly have had a room on the second or third floors had come in earlier in the evening. As it was I was given room No. 12 at the head of the stairs on the first floor, and went to bed as soon as possible Awful Cry of Fire.

"I remember hearing the clock strike 1 o'clock. As nearly as I can tell, it was about 3 o'clock when I was awakened by someone in the hall saying 'fire.'

"I thought at first it might be a fire omewhere down the street, and did not pay a great deal of attention, "A moment later I again heard the call of 'Fire,' and jumped out of bed and made for the door.
