Dread Disease Has Appeared in Several Michigan Cities.

Saginaw, Mich., Nov. 10. — One hour before the local board of health received a letter from Miss May Coomey, asking for information about her brother James, from whom she had not heard since the outbreak of the present epidemic of smallpox, her relative died of the disease. Coomey was a miner, 40 years old.

Three mild cases were reported to the health board on Thursday. Agent Merrick, of the Pere Marquette Railroad, has been notified by Vassar to stop selling tickets on the road with Vassar as a terminal and also to refuse all freight for that point. The communication was forwarded to the

state railroad commission. Lansing, Mich., Nov. 10. — One case of smallpox was reported in this city Thursday. A travelling man living on West Ottawa street is the victim, and it is said he contracted the disease in Saginaw. Druggists are reported to have sold out of vaccine points.

Seven at Flint. Flint, Mich., Nov. 10. — One case of smallpox of the malignant type was reported here Thursday. A 14-year-old girl, the daughter of a couple named Bennett, of West Fourth avenue, in a fashionable residence district of the city, is the victim, and she was removed to the pesthouse. There are six other cases of the mild type.

The bakery at Barrie was burned, with a loss of \$2,000.

Vancouver's building permits for October showed values of \$1,286,995.

Prince Rupert, B. C., is already complaining of congesting piles of trade.

An unknown man was struck by a train and killed near Moncton, N. B.

Albert Hogan, a Galt pressman, was seriously cut and bruised in an accident.

Prince Albert, Sask., had 125 applications for the position of chief of police.

Acute congestion of freight is reported in the C. P. R. stockyards at Winnipeg.

Gordon Ross, of Glangary County, was fined \$10 for duck hunting with a motor boat.

The Gananoque wheel factory, destroyed by fire recently, will be rebuilt shortly.

The Globe Laundry Works at St. John, N. B., were destroyed by fire. Loss \$15,000.

Lieut.-Col. Charles M. Dobell, of Quebec, has been appointed A. D. C. to King George.

The police census of Niagara Falls, Ont., shows that city to have a population of 19,038.

Mr. and Mrs. George Winter, of Guelph, celebrated their golden wedding anniversary.

A beam fell on Richard Clement, at Niagara Falls, broke his leg and crushed him badly.

Mrs. Whitehead, wife of the manager of the Brantford Carriage Company, died in that city.

After discussion, the Westminster, B. C., Presbytery has rejected the report on church union.

Lewis White, foreman stone cutter on the Edmonton court house, fell 50 feet and broke his neck.

Frank Rogers, 17, of St. Armand, Que., was burned to death in a fire which destroyed his home.

All steel fireproof motor cars, costing \$15,000 each, are used by the Long Island Railroad Company.

Miss F. H. Thompson, of Galt, Ont., is dead as the result of shock caused by a fall upon a sidewalk.

G. N. R. watchmen at Edmonton quit because their wages were cut from \$55 to \$45 per month.

Leonard Needham, aged 14, of Almonte, while out hunting was accidentally shot through the hip.

William MacKenzie, president of the C. N. R., gave \$10,000 to the Winnipeg Y. M. C. A. building fund.

James McLean, a prominent resident of Mount Pleasant, in Durham County, is dead. He was 85 years old.

Dominion mint officials at Ottawa report that coins seized at Hamilton, Ont., by the police are counterfeit.

The skating rink and several other buildings were destroyed by fire at Sault Ste. Marie. Total loss \$30,000.

It is rumored at Montreal that Thos. Tait will on his return from Australia, take a high position with the C. P. R.

The C. P. R. will inaugurate a service on a branch line, 30 miles long, from Wellington to Cameron Lake, B. C.

Amice Meurens, a boy who had both legs cut off by a freight train at Woodbridge, Man., died at St. Boniface Hospital.

English sparrows have crossed the Rockies and arrived at Nelson, B. C. They are not regarded as an unmixed blessing.

Mr. G. E. Faulkner, M. L. A., was elected president of the Halifax, N. S., Canadian Club, at its annual meeting last night.

Insurance adjusters have fixed the total property loss in the Victoria, B. C., fire at \$1,250,000, with insurance of \$850,000.

St. John, N. B., is looking forward to an aviation meet there next year. It is thought that \$15,000 would cover the expense.

Two Victoria, B. C., boys, Edgar Morley and Gordon Anderson, have volunteered for service in the Canadian navy.

Benjamin and Lea Bernstein have entered action against the Toronto Railway Company to recover \$10,000 damages for injuries.

For stealing a silver watch worth \$15, George Marshall, of St. John, N. B., was sent to the Dorchester Penitentiary for two years.

The C. N. R. will next year, put on another daily passenger train, between Edmonton and Winnipeg, and cut down running time.

The appointment is gazetted of Mr. Joy, to Strachan, for four years in Kingston Penitentiary.

For assaulting and robbing Edith Sauer on the mountain at Hamilton, Fred Anderson was sentenced to four years in Kingston Penitentiary.

George Wright, a C. N. R. contractor, was shot by a man named McIntyre at Debrairie, Man. There had been words between the men.

It is reported at Winnipeg that a railway line in the Peace River and Grand Prairie country is being surveyed by C. N. R. engineers.

The trial train driven by electricity made a trip yesterday from Ste. Flavie, Que., to Matane, a distance of about 45 miles in two hours.

At the Hamilton assizes, William Durrant, a tramp, was sentenced to two years less one day in the Central Prison for assault on a little girl.

The sudden death occurred on the train at Wetaskiwin, of Captain Fremont Crandell, chief timber inspector of the Grand Trunk Pacific at Prince Rupert.

Port Arthur's electrical supply has been hampered in the past few days by the failure of the water power and the steam plant has been called into requisition.

Mrs. Emma McCarthy, of Chicago, disappeared in Sarnia, Ont., on Oct. 19. She left for home on that day with her 17-months-old boy, and has not been seen since.

The New Brunswick Department of Agriculture is sending 175 boxes of apples from that province to be exhibited in London, Eng., states a St. John dispatch.

The office of assistant adjutant-general for signalling has been transferred from Kingston to Ottawa. This was the position occupied by the late Major Bruce Carruthers.

Sapper Johnston, a Quebec soldier, was found badly beaten and is still unconscious. His recovery is doubtful. Gunner Dinning is under arrest in connection with the matter.

Rev. G. W. Arnold, of Guelph, apologized to the principal of the College Institute for his statement from the pulpit that the G. C. boys were drinking on Thanksgiving Day.

It is believed at Vancouver that Black Hand methods were at the bottom of the death of Farfaro, an Italian, who was found on the railroad track near that city with a bullet in his brain.

Grand Master MacWatt, of Sarnia, dedicated the new lodge quarters of the Grand River Masonic Lodge, Berlin. A banquet followed the ceremony.

Brethren were present from Toronto, Galt, Preston and other points.

Dundas is the latest municipality to enter the hydro-electric circle. It

has closed a contract with the commission for 600 h.p. The big transforming station of the system is near the town, and this offers exceptional opportunity for an efficient service.

Mayor Evanson, of Prescott, is corresponding with the towns in Eastern Ontario interested in cheap power with a view to arranging a joint meeting of the commission and boards of trade to discuss this question and to place their demands before the hydro-electric commission.

Donald Clarke, aged 15, son of E. M. Clarke, of Odessa, Ont., who was kicked in the stomach by a horse, is dead. He was driving to school with two other children when the horse ran away, kicking over the dashboard. The others escaped without injuries.

Among important events to come before the Alberta Legislature are the attacks upon the Alberta and Great Waterways Railway, a report of the royal commission, and charges of graft laid at the door of Hon. W. E. Cushing.

That official building permit figures do not show the actual total of buildings was evidenced when three Port Arthur contractors were given nominal fines in police court for neglecting to take permits on a total of twenty business blocks and residences.

Mr. G. C. Cossar, of Glasgow, who purchased a large farm near Gagetown, N. B., as training home for Scotch boys, has brought out about fifty during the past year, and reports that they are doing well.

Margaret McDonald, an attractive girl, aged 17 years, who came to St. John, N. B., from Nova Scotia, last summer, with a circus, and has since been twice arrested for theft, has been sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.

The statement of the Halifax memorial tower fund shows cash in the bank amounting to \$11,600, and subscriptions as good as cash totalling \$23,500.

The tower is to be unveiled next summer on the occasion of the coming to Canada of the Duke of Connaught.

Following the English custom it is

understood that all the propositions for first and second-class drydocks under the subsidy act of the last session will be referred to the navy department at Ottawa for advice and report.

An action has been entered by Andrea Minghiozzi, of Toronto, to recover unstated damages from the Grand Trunk Railway. The plaintiff was working on the railway near Mimico when he was injured by a rail falling on him.

Four months at hard labor was the sentence given by Judge McTavish at Ottawa, to Jas. A. McCulloch, who was found guilty of the charge of stealing \$25 from the person of Mr. Jos. La-Jointe on Oct. 28.

He was found unconscious in bed this morning and rushed to St. Michael's Hospital, where a tank of oxygen was given him.
