**Brittle Nails.**  
Dear Miss Grey—I have brittle nails and I have long nails all around them. What will cure them? The half-moon does not show on them. What can I do? Please tell me what will stop the pain in my hands.

A—1. Manicure the nails regularly and rub oil cream thoroughly into the skin around the nails every night in drying the hands after washing them, push back the cuticle at the base of the nails with the towel. This will help keep the "half-moon" in sight. 2. Cure the bunions by wearing loose, comfortable shoes, keeping a pad between the first and second toe to relieve the pressure on the joint, and massaging with cooling lotion.

**To Cure Warts.**  
Dear Miss Grey—What will cure warts and what will relieve cold sores?  
A—Nitric acid applied two or three times with a small feather or wooden toothpick will eat off the warts, but it is necessary to be very careful as the acid burns badly. Keep it out of the reach of children. Camphor or peroxide of hydrogen will, if applied during the early stages of a cold sore, usually cure it.

## Four Ways to Cook Peaches

**Peach Pudding.**—Peel and stone six ripe peaches, fill the centres with Maraschino cherries. Put them on the ice to get cold. Make a custard of one cupful of milk with one-fourth of a cupful of sugar, yolks of three eggs and a tiny piece of butter. When this is cold, flavor it with almond. Line a dish with lady fingers. Put in the peaches, then the custard. Beat the whites of the eggs stiff and then add them to the custard of a cupful of cream whipped stiff. Sweeten and flavor. Cover the custard with a garnish of cherries and serve cold.

**Peach Shortcake.**—Make a rich cake by powder, cut out about a fourth of an inch thick, cut with a cutter into rounds, butter half of these, and place the unbuttered ones on top. Bake them, split them open, butter them, and fill and cover each one with fresh peaches cut in slices and sprinkled with powdered sugar. Bake, but surrounded by plenty of whipped cream, sweetened and flavored with almond extract and filled with chopped almonds, about one-half cupful.

**Peach and Fig Preserves.**—Take perfectly ripe freestone peaches and

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## NECK FIXINGS.

The dainty fichu lately introduced has become more than popular.

Very deep sailor collars and cuffs of broderie anglaise, made severely plain and entirely unfrilled, are the newest of accessories for sailor suits.

White chiffon collars, with a hem-stitched edge, are one of the pleasing bits of neckwear. They are considered a trifle smarter than the collar of batiste and eyelet embroidery, although the latter are very good-looking.

One of the very latest novelties from Paris is the frill jabot of pleated muslin, in which a pleated piece of material about twelve inches long is caught together in the centre with a strip of muslin and pinned at the front of the face collar, forming a semi-circle or spreading fan-shaped jabot. Another new jabot which is very similar has the lower edges graduated in length and obliquely. This is made of marquisette with lilies and edgings of Valenciennes or Cluny lace, between which a hint of color is introduced.

**HOBBLE SKIRT.**  
Among the notes of this month's Review is a somewhat startling report of the effect of models' dresses upon commerce, says a Westminster Gazette correspondent. The Chamber of Commerce of Turin, in a recent report drawn attention to the slump in local manufacturers, and suggests Parliamentary intervention. Turin is especially affected, with its long dresses, but scanty skirts have brought about what is feared to be an enormous amount of stockpiling of work. Dresses which formerly required from twelve to fourteen metres of lining now need only five, with the result that many mill-wheels do not move, and that numbers of weavers and dyers are thrown out of work altogether, or are put upon short time. The hope is expressed that leading dressmakers will come to the rescue, and their recent becoming London will assist in the sale of the hobbles. A thing to be noted in these post-Ruskin aesthetic days.

**Pan Pudding.**—Add sufficient milk to a pint of flour to make a stiff dough; knead and pound it for at least fifteen minutes. Cut it in quarters, roll each piece in a thin sheet of butter, brush the bottom of the pan with melted butter, put in a sheet of the paste, brush it lightly with melted butter. Have ready a quarter of a pound of shelled almonds, blanched, chopped fine, and mixed with a cupful of chopped raisins, half a pound of chopped apples, and a cupful of brown sugar. Put a layer of this mixture on the paste, cover with another sheet, brush

with suet, and so continue until all the sheets of paste are used. Brush the top sheet with melted suet, dust with sugar and bake in a quick oven for three-quarters of an hour. Remove very carefully from the pan to a flat dish and send at once to the table. If properly made this is one of the most delicate of all puddings.

**Sunday Night Salad.**—Calf's brains, boiled in salt and water, chilled on ice, cut in small dice, and served on a bed of lettuce, with mayonnaise and a delicious hot weather dish for Sunday night.

**IRISH AUTHORESS DEAD**

Katherine Cecil Thurston Dies in a Hotel at Cork.

London, Sept. 6.—Mrs. Katherine Cecil Thurston, the Irish authoress, was found dead this morning at a hotel in Cork.

Mrs. Thurston was a native of Cork, and married in 1901 Ernest Charles Thurston, with whom she was the joint author of several popular novels. The couple lived happily until 1907, when, according to Mrs. Thurston, her husband informed her that it was necessary that he should live his own life, and for the purpose of literary work should go down into the very depths of society. The authoress was granted a divorce in the spring of 1910.

**NOTED DETECTIVE DEAD.**

Paris, Sept. 6.—The death is announced today of Armand Cocheffert, a former noted chief of the detective service of Paris. He was born in 1850.

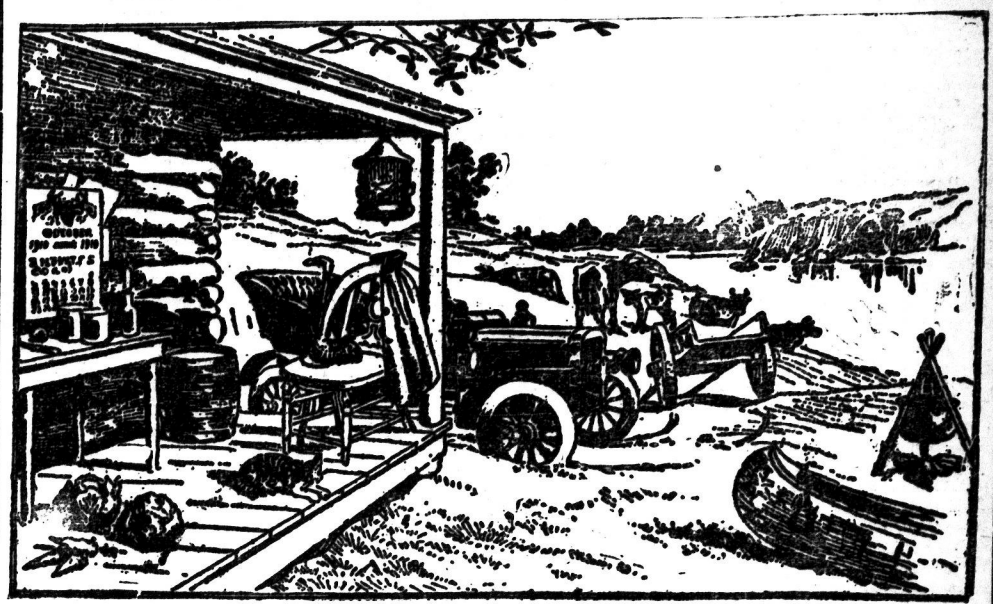
**SEIZED A TRAWLER.**
