## LUMBER MERCHANT SHOT BY BURGLAR

Probably Fatally Wounded  
After Desperate Battle in  
the Dark.

## MARAUDER ESCAPED

Provincial Police and a Doctor Sent to  
Assistance of Wounded  
Man.

Orillia, March 23. — In a desperate struggle with a masked burglar, shortly before 1 o'clock tonight, Allan McPherson, one of the best-known lumbermen in the country, was shot in the thigh, and so badly wounded that he may not recover. The burglar escaped. Mr. McPherson lives at Longford Mills, across the lake from Orillia, with his two adopted children. His is a handsome residence, and as he is a man of considerable wealth it is thought that the burglar surmised that he would make a rich haul.

Word of the shooting was sent to Mayor Goffart, of this town, who at once sent Provincial Constables Wright and Holmes, with Dr. Harvie, to the scene of the attack, which is several miles from Orillia, by road. The mayor also notified Superintendent Rogers, of the provincial police, by telephone, but was informed that the superintendent had no man to send to Orillia on Monday morning.

**Burglar Had Rifle.**  
Details of the shooting are not all to hand. It is thought that Mr. McPherson heard the burglar in his house, and upon going down stairs to investigate was met by the crackman, who was a short man with a red handkerchief tied over his face, concealing everything but his eyes. The man carried a large rifle, which he pointed at Mr. McPherson, and threatened to shoot if he was not given money.

Mr. McPherson struggled with the burglar, and after being shot managed to wrench the rifle out of his hands. Before he could get a shot at the marauder, however, the man jumped through a window and escaped.

Mr. McPherson, who is 65 years old, is very well known and very popular in this district. He is the head of the McPherson Lumber Company, is connected with the Longford foundry, the Spanish River Pulp and Paper Company and other large corporations. If it is found that he is suffering too much to move he will be attended at his home; otherwise he will be brought back to Orillia in the morning.

## FIRE AT NORWOOD, MANITOBA.

Winnipeg, March 22.—Fire Friday morning, probably of incendiary origin, completely destroyed two new two-story frame dwellings at the corner of Listnas and Patterson, Norwood, Winnipeg, entailing a loss of \$10,000 on the owner, D. Gernat. The houses were not yet occupied.

## FARMERS SUFFERED HEAVIEST LOSSES

Very Little Wind Insurance  
Was Carried in This  
District.

## WORST IN THE NORTH

Gale Wrought Havoc at Owen Sound  
and the Loss is Estimated  
at \$250,000.

Reports, which are gradually coming in from all over the district, indicate that the damage in the recent big blow was even heavier than was anticipated. From many districts it was impossible to secure accurate reports on Saturday owing to the telegraph and telephone wires being down. With the opening of the lines came further details of heavy losses. Insurance men state that they never remember a storm in which the farmers suffered so heavily. Hundreds of barns were unroofed, and dozens were demolished. As a result of the very small amount of wind insurance carried, the loss will fall heavily on the owners. Insurance men say that they expect a big increase in the wind insurance policies.

Owen Sound, March 23.—That the wreck and ruin of Friday's gale will aggregate nearly half a million dollars in losses is the estimate formed. The damage to farm buildings is more extensive than in any previous gale, and from every quarter come long lists of wrecked and damaged barns. In town the industrial buildings have suffered to a greater extent than first reports would indicate. The bank building of the Canadian Malleable Iron Company had its gables blown in and the roof ripped off or punctured by falling debris. Two thousand dollars will not cover the damage. The Canadian Heating and Ventilating Company's loss will be equally heavy, the roof from the main building being ripped off and scattered over a wide area, while the other portions were perforated by flying boards and timbers. The group of factories just north of Elgin street escaped with a few of the stacks being blown down. The Galbraith Company's planing mill had the roof torn off and wrecked.

**A HEAVY LOSS.**  
The worst damage was done to the big four-story factory of the North American Fur Company, on the west side, where the whole east wall was blown out as though an explosion had taken place. The damage to the building was accentuated by the opening of the sprinkler system of fire protection, and the damaging by water by several thousand dollars' worth of case furniture.

A chimney on the First Methodist Church was blown over and crashed through the annex containing the organ loft and other portions, leaving a wrecked structure that will cost several hundred dollars to repair. At the Queen's Hotel a large kitchen chimney fell through the ceiling of the dining-room, and throughout the town this was the experience of scores of houses. Over a hundred trees were blown down in Harrison's Park, and shade trees in town and the other parks were uprooted or broken off.

**AT KINCARDINE.**  
**[Special to The Advertiser.]**  
Kincardine, March 22.—Latest reports from all over this district indicate that the losses in yesterday's gale will run into several thousand dollars. As a result of a large chimney on the Traders' Bank blowing over the electric wires were broken, and the town was in darkness.

The Coleman pork packing establishment had the roof blown off and carried to the slaughter-house. A large pane of glass was broken in the public library. Many other buildings had roofs blown off and windows blown in. The worst accident in town was the large brick house of McCue Bros., the east end and side seemed to open, and the roof dropped in. No one was hurt. Out in the country from all directions word is coming by telephone, but many of the 'phones are still out of commission. The barn of Wm. Blain was unroofed and Mr. Finlayson's house was damaged by having a chimney blown off.

Wesley Potter had his new barn blown down in Huron Township. Allan McLeod, near Lorn, had his barn and house blown down. D. Grosberg's barn and stable were blown down.

## BARN DEMOLISHED.

**[Special to The Advertiser.]**  
Lucknow, March 22.—Yesterday's hurricane caused a lot of damage in this locality. Everywhere the evidences of the tremendous force of the wind is to be seen. Barns are laid flat, roofs torn off and fences levelled.

In the town the roof of J. Joynt's warehouse at the G. T. R. station was lifted and laid across the tracks. In the warehouse ten carloads of dried apples were stored. A gang of men were soon got together and the whole stock was transferred to box cars on the track.

The Methodist Church was badly damaged by part of the tower, which fell through the roof. The waterworks roof was lifted and carried across the river. The belfry of the Roman Catholic Church was blown over. Telephone wires all down and telegraphs put out of business.

## WORST IN YEARS.

**[Special to The Advertiser.]**  
Windsor, March 22.—Yesterday's windstorm was the worst in this locality known in many years, considerable damage being done. The Wyoming butter factory, owned by the Lambton Creamery Company, was partially unroofed, and the large water tank lifted into the middle of the road.

The Wanstead school was unroofed. Mr. D. M. Robertson's barn was partially unroofed, while that of McKinnley Bros., on the adjoining farm, fared likewise. Great patches of shingles are torn from nearly every building, while many chimneys parted company.

Orchards, too, suffered, some of the very healthiest trees being snapped off near the ground, while fences, particularly any of the old-style board fence are lying level, and windmills are minus their machinery.

**AT DRESDEN.**  
**[Special to The Advertiser.]**  
Dresden, March 22.—The windstorm which raged here yesterday did a great deal of damage, blowing the roofs off several buildings in town and breaking windows in several stores. Laird Bros.' lumber yard has the appearance of having been through a cyclone, the piles having been scattered and broken lumber strewn the streets. The smokesack was blown off the canning factory, and the roof off Mahler Bros.' dry kiln.

**THIRTY-FOUR BARN UNROOFED**  
**[Special to The Advertiser.]**  
Walkerton, March 22.—The worst windstorm in many years visited this locality yesterday. Farmers visiting in town today report that very few barns escaped some damage, while the larger number suffered seriously.

Between this town and Teeswater (about 16 miles) 26 barns are almost total wrecks. From Cargill (a distance of seven miles) a traveller counted from the car window eight barns wrecked.

## WINDMILLS A SPECIAL PREY

Windmills were a special prey to the wind. A large amount of standing timber has been blown down. In town a large number of shade trees have been ruined. Part of the exhibition building was wrecked and the grandstand blown into the river. A large chimney on the hospital was wrecked. The sheds around the school buildings were badly damaged. The town was cut off from telephone and telegraph communication.

## SILOS BLOWN OVER.

**[Special to The Advertiser.]**  
Alvinston, March 22.—The windstorm which passed over this vicinity yesterday did a great deal of damage. Two barns on con. 7, Brooke, were totally demolished. A number of silos were also wrecked.

Several large windmills in Dr. P. P. Winn's office were blown in, and thousands of dollars' worth of damage was done throughout the country. The smokesack on the power-house was blown over.

## PATIENTS OF FRIEDMAN ARE GAINING WEIGHT

Ten Who Took the Vaccine  
Cure Are Showing Marked  
Improvement.

New York, March 23.—Ten sufferers from tuberculosis, who were inoculated Monday by Dr. Friedrich F. Friedman, declared at a clinic yesterday that their health has improved since receiving treatment. Before entering the clinic, Dr. Friedman authorized an announcement that two weeks hence he will return to Germany for a brief period to complete unfulfilled laboratory tests. He will return to the United States, hopeful that by that time the Government health authorities will have recognized his vaccine as a cure.

The visiting specialist consented to an interruption of his dissection. He has long enough to have Dr. John W. Brannan, head of Bellevue Hospital, the city institution where the clinic was held, question patients treated five days ago. Government physicians, private practitioners, 30 nurses and about 100 students of the Bellevue and Cornell Medical Colleges were present.

Nine of ten patients reported they gained from three-quarters of a pound to four and one-half pounds since Monday. None had been troubled with night sweats since Wednesday. None suffered with hemorrhages since Tuesday. None had pains since Thursday, and from Monday to Thursday felt their pains decreasing. Nine of them felt "better and stronger" generally.

Twenty-three sufferers were treated today. Eighteen had pulmonary tuberculosis, and other affection of the bones. There was a 2-year-old child with an arm so swollen that Dr. Friedman could not locate a vein. He was holding the baby by the ankles, head downward, the physician injected his vaccine in the jugular vein and again intramuscularly on the legs.

Dr. J. S. Atkinson, a physician of Marltonette, Wis., who walked miles through the snow to reach a railroad station on his way east, was refused admittance as a patient of the clinic today. Dr. Friedman was anxious to treat his fellow physician, but the tuberculosis committee of the hospital ruled against it on the ground that Dr. Atkinson is not a resident of this state. He is preparing to return to his home in Baltimore, and will over-rule the tuberculosis committee.

**SMALLPOX SCARE**  
Dozen Mild Cases Were Located Just Below Sandwich.

Windsor, March 23.—More than a dozen cases of smallpox in a mild form have been reported from Ojibwa, just below the town of Sandwich, and five families are at present under quarantine.

The disease first made its appearance nearly eight weeks ago, and has continued with more or less prevalence ever since. Despite efforts made by the local health officials to stamp it out, vaccination has been resorted to. The provincial board of health has been notified, and is investigating the origin of the outbreak.

## CHURCH BURNED

Catholic Church at La Salette Has  
Only Walls Standing.

Aylmer, March 23.—The Roman Catholic Church at La Salette was totally destroyed by fire at an early hour on Saturday morning. The fire was discovered by the crew of a Michigan Central Railway train passing by, but the flames had already made such headway that nothing could be done to save the edifice. The church was a handsome brick structure. Rev. Father Brennan is the priest of that parish.

## GEN. CARRINGTON DEAD

Was Wounded Severely in the Basuto War in 1881.

London, March 23.—Major-Gen. Sir Frederick Carrington, K.C.M.G., K.C.B., died yesterday at Colchester at the age of 69 years. He had an interesting military career, and was wounded severely in the Basuto war of 1881.

Sir Frederick was born at Cheltenham on Aug. 23, 1844. He was commander of a force in the Rhodesian rebellion, commanded the infantry at Gibraltor during 1895 to 1899, held a similar position in the Beifast district in 1900, and was commander of the Rhodesian field force in the Boer war.

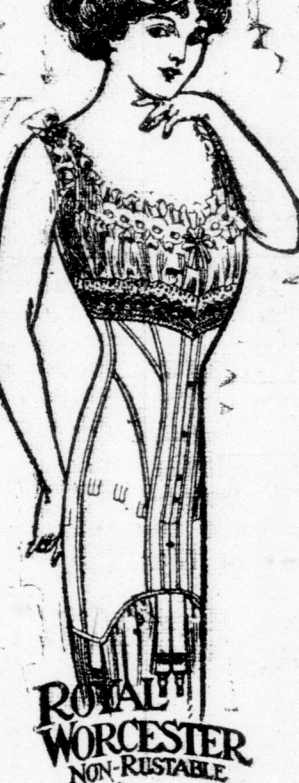

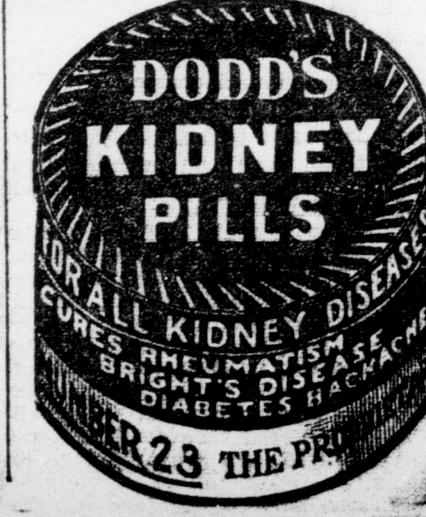

## FIREMAN KILLED, TWO INJURED

Friday's Storm Fatal to a Member of Sturgeon Falls Brigade.

Sturgeon Falls, March 24.—One fireman was instantly killed and two other mortally hurt when the tower of the fire hall here blew down just as the brigade were leaving to respond to an alarm, when the storm was at its height on Friday afternoon. The dead and injured were: Dead—Fireman King, aged 16. Fatally injured—Fireman Hertz, Fireman Sylvester.

The horses drawing the reel were also killed. The fire department had been kept extremely busy during the gale, answering no fewer than 16 calls, but the fires themselves were not very serious. The town was hard hit by the storm, roofs being blown off and several small buildings blown down.
