# HOLD ELECTION SOON

Will Probably Take Advantage of Opportunity Shown Yesterday—Beck Slated For Premier.

Ottawa, June 30.—A general election is likely to be held in the autumn. If the Manitoba Government is returned to power on July 10, it is understood that Premier Borden will dissolve Parliament and appeal to the people.

It is understood that the Dominion Government urged the

Ontario administration to bring on the election which was held yesterday for the purpose of testing and confirming the sentiment in Ontario. It is well satisfied with the result and feels that it can make an appeal to the Ontario electors successfully in a federal contest.
