# GOT HIM PERPETUAL PASSES BRILLIANT EXPLOIT BY THE CANADIANS

Correspondent Says They Captured Trench Against Enormous Odds Sunday.

SUFFER NO CASUALTIES

[Special Cable to The Advertiser.] London, March 9 .- The Boulogne respondent of the Daily Telegraph writes that from a reliable source learns that a company of Canadians last Sunday evening, after a gallant fight against enormous odds, captured trench near Lombaertzyde. Six Months Till End.

"Six months, I think, will see the finish," he declares. "It was terrible at Ypres. I was not there, although we were close enough to see what was going on. We are near to where the Germans are trying now to get through our lines. They attacked us five times one day, but we beat them back every time. They will never get through.

Mud Like Glue.

"The weather is bad, and we have had snow, and the mud is like glue. I shall be glad when the summer comes, so that we can move one way or the other. It is simply rotten being stuck here all the time."

In a letter written several weeks ago, Corporal Reading speaks of the expectancy with which the British troops looked forward to the arrival of the Canadians. That news travels quickly to the men in the trenches is shown by a statement he made in his letter, written just at the time when the Canadians left Salisbury. He said: "We have heard that the Canadians are leaving Salisbury, and I hope they will soon arrive. The more men we have the sconer this affair will be over with. I also marked in your last letter that two more contingents are being formed in Canada. Send them
