

CANADIANS KEEN AFTER SOUVENIRS

Themselves Victims of French Collectors, They Go After Shells.

2 CORPORALS WOUNDED

Shorncliffe Hospital Now Full, Mostly With Boys From Dominion.

[Special Cable to The Advertiser.] London, March 9.—Sovereign hunting from Canadians by natives of Northern France has resulted in the Canadians reaching the line of battle almost left of buttons and badges.

A corporal now in hospital here has something to say about the manner in which the Canadians themselves were sent to the front. "The first time that I was sent to the front," he said, "I felt alone and dropped in a shell about three hundred yards away. A lot of our boys started off into the open to pick up bits of the shell as souvenirs. They were ordered back at once, but several got what they set out for."

The battalion did trench work for some time, and after twenty-four hours they all got tired. The most awkward thing about it to my mind was getting in the trenches. You are practically all right once there, so long as you keep your head down. There had been no casualties in the 1st Battalion when I left, although a good deal of sickness."

Was in France. A corporal in Shorncliffe with a thigh fractured by a German bullet was in one of these terrible rushes which the Germans made. The German trenches some days ago, when he received a wound which has ended his fighting for many days to come. He is now in the hospital. He was admitted to Shorncliffe on Saturday, and his condition today is satisfactory.

Major George Hignett, who is in the hospital, was operated on last week. He is progressing splendidly. Shorncliffe hospital now contains five patients. The hospital is full. Most of these are Canadians.

PATRIOTISM STRONG IN PEOPLE OF CLINTON

Splendid Work Accomplished By Women's Society—For Soldiers and Sufferers.

Clinton, March 8.—The patriotic spirit has certainly entered very deeply into the minds of the people of Clinton. The following is a complete list of work accomplished since the Women's Patriotic Society resumed work after Christmas: 219 pairs of socks, 150 pairs of mittens, 2 scarves, 40 balaclava caps, 2 day caps, 15 chokers, 67 flannel day caps, 100 flannel night shirts, 26 pyjamas, 100 flannel shirts, 48 bed socks.

Eleven who have enlisted with the 2nd and 3rd Battalions have received complete outfits, composed of the following: flannel shirt, 2 pairs socks, 1 scarf, 1 pair of mittens, 1 cap, 1 choker, 2 handkerchiefs, 1 towel, 1 washcloth, 1 case soap, 1 pipe and tobacco. Seven complete outfits were sent in a month to London by the Canadian War Contingent Association, consisting of 7 shirts, 14 pairs of socks, 2 pairs of mittens, 2 scarves, 2 cases, 25 for chokers, 100 flannel night shirts, 26 pyjamas, 100 flannel shirts, 48 bed socks.

Readers, the society made and donated 104 new garments suitable for children from 1 to 8 years to the Queen Mary New Year's Gift, and 20 cases of clothing and groceries, valued at \$100, to the Belgian Relief Fund at Montreal.

LOCAL YOUNG MEN MAY BE ARRESTED

Case of Young Girl in Juvenile Court Particularly Sad One.

Following a story told by a young girl, a week in juvenile court today by Police Magistrate J. C. Judd, the police may issue warrants for the arrest of some young men who are contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

The girl, taken into custody by the police last night, told of a story in which she involved some local young men, and which caused her to be taken into custody for a week in order that the police may investigate her story.

Presented Sad Sight. With her parents, the girl, who is not over 12 years of age, was sitting on a bench, and her eyes were dimmed with tears, presented a sight that is seldom seen at police headquarters.

Police officials stated that there would likely be some arrests made in connection with the case if the girl's story proved true.

HIS CLOGGING AND PATTERN GOT HIM PERPETUAL PASSES

Many Interesting Personalities Among Soldiers of 18th Battalion.

Among the men who go to make up the personnel of the 18th Battalion are many interesting personalities. Of course, there are all soldiers now, but in private life a generous proportion of them have gained distinction in one way or another and have enjoyed quite a good deal of fame.

For instance, Sgt. George B. Filmer is a well-known inventor and engineer, and incidentally a cousin of Sir Robert Filmer, Bart, and the next in line for the title. Sir Robert, who is a famous English K. C., is at present serving as a captain with the Grenadier Guards and is believed to be on the front line somewhere in France.

The first holder of the title was Lord Filmer, on whom it was conferred in 1816, having been changed from Filmer to Filmer in 1820.

Sergeant Filmer Famous. Sergeant Filmer also has been famous in a certain extent by his invention of such time-saving and trouble-saving devices as the well-known Filmer demountable automobile tire rim and vacuum and gas pump system for the transportation of liquids, steam, gases, air, vapor and matter from one point to another without any appreciable change in temperature.

At present he is working on two inventions, about which he is not very discursive, but which he admits may have considerable effect on submarine warfare. He has been offered a

commission with the British engineers, but expects to transfer to the experimental branch of the navy when he gets to England.

Noted Comedian. Another member of the battalion who was a good deal in the public eye up to the time of his enlistment is Pte. Dan Crawley, a comedian, at one time quite well known to patrons of the English vaudeville stage, and a member of the famous Fred Karno Company of comedians.

He has been in America some years now, and has made the complete round of the Pacific Coast, and is now in the Pacific Theatre here, and was playing in Detroit until a few days before he enlisted.

Perpetual Pass. He is at present orderly servant to Lieut. A. B. Laine, and is very popular among the officers who are never tired of listening to his comic patter, and watching his clever clog dancing. His popularity has brought him material advantage in the form of a perpetual pass, which allows him to come and go almost as he pleases, and is something which he claims no other private possesses.

He is distinctly popular, too, with the fellows of the Base Company to which he is attached. For their benefit he often goes to the theatre, and rather than part of it, for it is a long one, and the man thinks no end of him.

Private Crawley has a brother and a brother-in-law in the same regiment, and he knows neither of them has seen fighting during the present war up to now.

ST. JOHN AMBULANCE CORPS WILL MOBILIZE IMMEDIATELY

Different Units Will Centralize in Toronto—London Men Going.

St. John Ambulance Corps will mobilize in Toronto immediately from all over the Dominion. The corps will leave for France in about a month's time. The two men from London who will go with the corps are John B. Hay and Russell T. Welch, both of this city.

Word was received today by W. Love, superintendent of the Canadian division of the St. John Ambulance Corps, ordering the London men who have volunteered for overseas work to report in London at once. Love expects that they will also leave in the course of a few days for Toronto, and go to France with him.

The Ambulance Corps is a separate unit from the military ambulance corps, and will be in charge of part of the Canadian Hospital at Boulogne, in France, close to the front.

Italy on Eve of Decisive Events. Meeting of Ministers Leads to Belief—Premier's Peculiar Remarks.

ROME, Monday, March 8, via Paris. March 8.—Premier Salandra, after his visit Sunday to Gotha, to transport to London by a special train, a journey during which a very considerable degree of national feeling was manifested, had a long interview with Foreign Minister Sonnino today. Tonight the council of ministers met in session.

These facts, together with other indications, lead to the widespread belief that Italy is upon the eve of great and decisive events.

One of the Premier's remarks at Gotha is attracting considerable attention. Referring to the kind of brown bread allowed in Italy after March 22, Signor Salandra said: "This is a noble bread. Our soldiers will be the first to eat it. It is upon the eve of great and decisive events."

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BRILLIANT EXPLOIT BY THE CANADIANS

Correspondent Says They Captured Trench Against Enormous Odds Sunday.

SUFFER NO CASUALTIES

British Casualty List Includes Many Officers Wounded—One Killed.

[Special Cable to The Advertiser.] London, March 9.—The Boulougne correspondent of the Daily Telegraph writes from a reliable source he learns that a company of Canadians last Sunday evening, after a gallant fight against enormous odds, captured a trench near Lonsbaert, and the enemy lost numbers of men, but the Canadians had no casualties of any description.

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\$385,000 BUDGET FOR WORKS BOARD

Storm Sewer and Pavement Programs Up For Consideration Tonight.

EARLY DECISION IS URGED

City Engineer and Drainage Expert Recommend Speedy Start On Work.

Paving, storm-water sewer and sanitary sewer programs for the year will be outlined in all likelihood by the board of works at its meeting in the city hall this evening. The \$385,000 program, which has been recommended in the Advertiser in detail before, plus the \$200,000 program for storm sewers, will be taken up.

Members of the board of works are expected to carry with them opposition, while there may be some deletions from the \$200,000 storm sewer program of Engineer William Chipman, the Toronto expert, who is in charge of the storm sewer.

Speedy Action Needed. Both engineers have impressed on the members the necessity for speedy action in outlining the plans for the year's work. The value of early start in the program is emphasized, and it is pointed out that the lower contract prices that prevail then have been emphasized in no uncertain manner. The present economic situation and the necessity of not out of work is another contributing cause to urge the speedy decisions of the aldermen.

Members of the fire, water and light committee as well as the board of council have been invited to meet with the board of works in deciding this \$385,000 budget.

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
