DOUBT OF STATE CAN TOUCH THAW

Justices So Express Them-
selves at Hearing In
New York.

[Canadian Press.]

NEW YORK, March 26.—Two jus-
tices of the appellate division of the
supreme court agreed today that there
was no doubt in their minds whether
the state of New York would be with-
in its right in "bouncing" upon Harry
K. Thaw, after his acquittal there on
the conspiracy charge on which he
was extradited from New Hampshire
and returned here to the state hospi-
tal for the Criminal Insane at Mat-
tawean.

They were Justice Ingraham, pre-
siding, and Justice Scott. To vote
their views they interrupted Franklin
Kennedy, special deputy attorney-
general, in charge of the state's case
against Thaw, while he was arguing
before the appellate division against
an appeal taken by Thaw's counsel
from a decision of Supreme Court
Justice Justice Ingraham to return
Thaw to New Hampshire.

Upon the conclusion of the argu-
ments, which were brief, decision was
made. There are three kinds of lies,
by attorneys connected with the case
that the decision might be handed
down during the next week.

HERO OF DISASTER
HAS PASSED AWAY

SARNIA, March 26.—John Edward
Blaise died at the hospital today from
pneumonia. "Jackey," as he was called,
was well known, particularly among
railwaymen, having been employed
on the Grand Trunk for years.

He was taken ill about a week ago.
At the time of the tunnel disaster
on October 9, 1904, when six G. T. R.
employees lost their lives and several
others had narrow escapes, John Ed-
ward Blaise was one of the rescue
party and was successful in saving
several lives. He was aged 35 years.

HOLLAND LIKELY TO
DEMAND DAMAGES

Press Says Compensation For
Sunken Boats Must Be
Complete.

[Canadian Press.]

LONDON, March 26.—Reuters' Am-
sterdam correspondent gives the out-
line of a statement posted today by
the Netherlands government, that
the Netherlands of the sinking of the
Beachy Head, Thursday of the Dutch
steamer Medea. The statement says
that the Dutch government has no in-
tention of being satisfied with a com-
pensation for the loss of the ship, but
that it has been considered conditional
contraband and adds:

"The sinking of the Medea is an act
of aggression, and the Netherlands gov-
ernment is considering a claim for com-
pensation for the loss of the ship, as well
as the attacks on Dutch ships from the
Atlantic. The statement says that the
Dutch government has no intention of
being satisfied with a compensation for
the loss of the ship, but that it has been
considered conditional contraband and
adds:

"We are convinced that complete
compensation must be demanded for the
loss of the ship, as well as the attacks
on Dutch ships from the Atlantic. This
last act is certain to arouse great
unpleasantness and bitterness here."

CONFERENCE AT THE HAGUE.

THE HAGUE (via London), March
26.—Members of the Netherlands gov-
ernment are refraining from any com-
ment on the interference with and de-
struction of Dutch shipping by German
submarines beyond saying that requests
for explanations have been sent to
Germany with a view to an eventual
protest after Berlin's reply has been re-
ceived.

The Ministry held an extraordinary
council this afternoon, following a con-
ference between the Foreign Minister,
Ministers and the Marine Minis-
ter and the chief of the naval staff.
The subjects under discussion were not
made public.

The newspapers are taking a serious
view of the situation, owing, as they
say, to the repeated unpleasant in-
cidents.

FEARED EITEL WAS
PREPARING TO LEAVE

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 26.—
Runners from Newport News reached
Washington late today that the Prinz
Eitel Friedrich, the German sea raider,
dock there for repairs after her com-
manding officer, Rear Admiral von
Dietrich, was reported to have de-
parted. One report said the cruiser
actually left her dock, the shipyard
and was putting out to sea to escape
or bid defiance to British and French
warships patrolling beyond the Virginia
capes.

All these stories were proved ground-
less, however, as the Prinz Eitel was
at her dock tonight and repair work
was said still to be in progress.

WAR DEPENDS UPON
MEN AND MUNITIONS

LONDON, March 27.—12:35 a.m.—In
a statement to the London Times, re-
plying to a request for an interpreta-
tion of the phrase "a protracted war,"
which he used in a recent interview,
Field Marshal Sir John French, com-
mander-in-chief of the British forces in
France, said:

"The protraction of the war depends
entirely upon the supply of men and
munitions. Should these be unsatis-
factory the war will be accordingly
prolonged. I dwell emphatically on the
need for munitions."

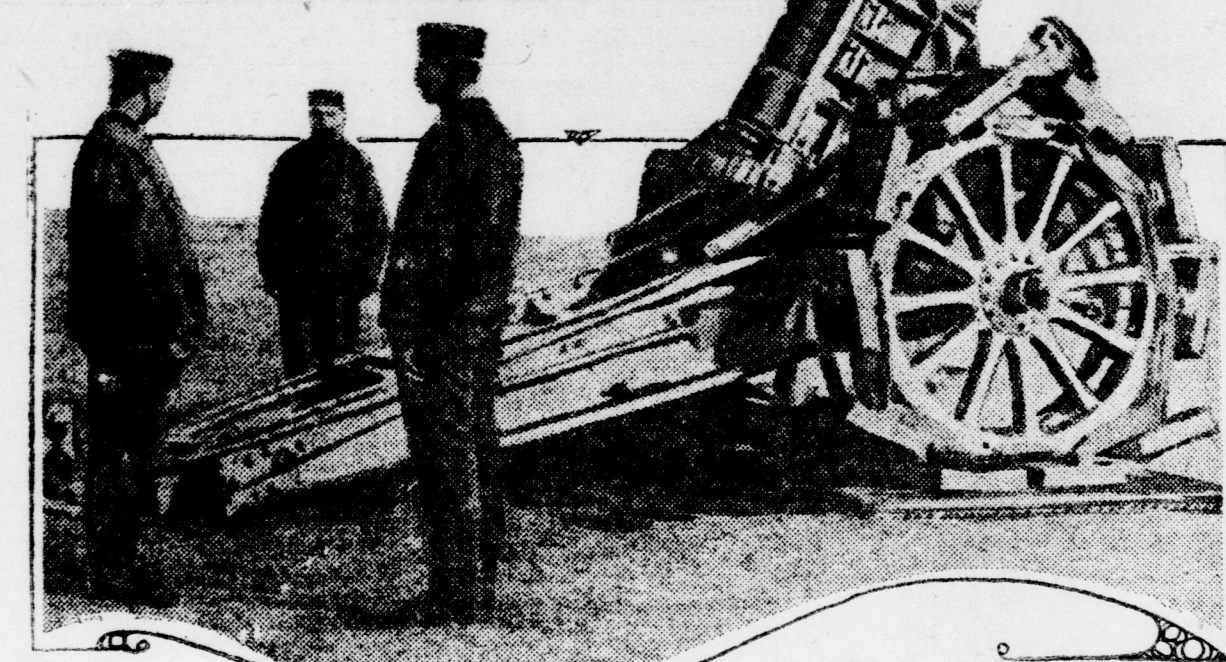
I also promised you a little chat on

As the wind blows and catches the
surface of the kite, it (the wind) is
deflected and has a consequent re-
action, which lifts the kite into the air. In put-
ting a kite up, if the wind is blowing
hard you can set it off by simply stand-
ing and holding the string, but if there
is not much wind you must run in the
direction that the breeze is blowing.
You then, by running and pulling the
kite, cause a resistance to the
atmosphere, which is equal to the blow-
ing of the wind, and sustains the kite
in the same manner.

LABOR TROUBLES WORRYING BRITAIN

Kitchener's Warning Fails In
Effect—Drastic Action Is
Feared.

LONDON, March 26.—9:45 p.m.—
Despite Lord Kitchener's warning and
the agreement between the Government
and the trades unions that strikes
should cease, stoppages of work still
continue. Though the number of men
involved thus far is small, fears are
expressed that the disaffection may
spread, and the Government be driven
to adopt the drastic measures which
have been threatened in order to in-
crease industrial production.

At Birkenhead this afternoon the
men leading three steamers quit work
and announced that they would not re-
sume their labors until Monday. Their
ground was that they are not paid un-
til the following week for work done
on Friday and Saturday.

On the Liverpool side of the Mersey
a large number of dockers are threat-
ening to strike for a similar reason,
and to lay off for an entire week. At
the Docks, Wales, steel works Gov-
ernment orders for materials needed in
France and Belgium are being delayed
by a strike of a comparatively small
number of men, which has dislocated
work in the establishment.

The Clyde engineers are much dis-
satisfied with the recent Government
arbitration award and intend to ask
for a further increase in pay.

It is known that a Bristol machine
is owned on the isthmus at present,
but its whereabouts has not been as-
certained.
