

REPORT HEAVY NAVAL 'CUTS' TO GENEVA PARLEY

Many Nations Also Reduce
Land Forces by Large
Figures.

HAITI MAKES PROTEST

Delegate Bellegarde Asks
Probe of South African
Killing of Hottentots.

GENEVA, Sept. 8.—Reports presented by the council of the League of Nations on reduction of armaments at this afternoon's session of the third assembly of the league show that in more than a score of countries which furnished figures restriction of military outlay has begun.

Great Britain reported a reduction of 55 per cent in naval tonnage; France 36 per cent; Italy 49 per cent and Japan 59 per cent.

In land armaments Great Britain reported a reduction of 200,000 men under arms and shortening of the term of military service by one-half. Sweden also reported cutting her military service in two. Italy reduced the period of service and suppressed 25 battalions of infantry. Poland reduced her army of a million men to about 500,000. Japan made reductions but failed to give figures, while Switzerland reduced from 70 per cent to 55 per cent the proportion of her men eligible for military service.

Delegate Bellegarde of Haiti took the floor today and made the most eloquent speech of the session. He reviewed the work of the council and demanded an investigation of the operations of a punitive expedition by the South African government some time ago against the natives of southwest African territory, for which South Africa has the mandate.

According to an official report received by the league of nations, the punitive expedition killed 49 natives, several of whom were women or children. The report did not mention any South African losses.

PIONEER RESIDENT OF ARRAN TOWNSHIP DIES

Miss Ann Coleman, 85 years old, prominent church worker, passed.

TARA, Sept. 8.—Miss Ann Coleman, 85 years old, one of the few remaining pioneers of the township of Arran, passed away at the home of her brother, James M. Coleman, near Invermay.

The late Miss Coleman was born in Adajala Township, Simcoe County, in 1837, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Coleman. She emigrated to Canada from Ireland in the year 1854.

The family resided for a few years in Owen Sound prior to removing to Arran Township in 1854, where Miss Coleman resided up to the time of her death.

She was a member of the Invermay Anglican Church and for many years a Sunday School teacher. Her brother and one sister survive: James M. Coleman, Arran, and Mrs. Margaret Craig of Paisley.

ORDERS WALLACEBURG MAN TO RETURN MONEY

HEAD OF C. N. R. TO BE NAMED SOON

Ottawa Reports Support
Rumor That Government
Has Chosen Railway
President.

OTTAWA, Sept. 8.—An announcement of the appointment of a new head for the Canadian National Railway is expected within the next few days. The government, it is understood, has a man in view and is fairly well assured that he will accept the post.

It is not the intention of the minister, however, to make an announcement of the entire board for some time to come. It is proposed that the president shall have a say in the choice of the executive, thus dissipating the impression that the appointments would be political in character.

While undoubtedly knowledge and experience in conditions throughout the various parts of the country will be taken into account when making the choice it is not regarded as at all likely that provincial considerations will weigh in the selection. It is proposed to secure the best men irrespective of where they hail from.

Not until the main executive has been appointed will the task of dividing the national system into "grand divisions" and of appointing managers and officials be proceeded with. The executive will make a careful canvass of the whole situation and his recommendations will prevail.

So far as the government is concerned its "interference" may be said to pretty well cease as soon as a new head has been appointed.

CREDITMEN FIND STEADY BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT

WINNIPEG, Sept. 8.—(By Canadian Press.)—This week's trade report of the Creditmen's Trust Association is in substance as follows:

Manufacturers and wholesalers in the east are finding a steady improvement in business and there has been more activity in the retail than for some little time past, owing, no doubt, to the end of the holiday season.

There is quite a lot of building going on in both Montreal and Toronto, perhaps more pronounced in Toronto, and the unemployment question is getting to be much less serious, the larger centers reporting little unemployment.

Conditions west of the lakes have been somewhat interfered with by rain which has delayed the threshing operations. Wholesale business is keeping steady, retail business leaves a good deal to be desired, though in certain lines more business is being done.

Collections are somewhat on the slow side which, however, is to be expected just at this period.

PRESTON-GALT ROAD STARTED

Continuous Pavement Will
Soon Be Available To
Hamilton Highway.

Suburban Roads Commission
Takes Over Short Strip As
Connecting Link.

GALT, Sept. 7.—Things have moved rapidly in roadway projects here this week. The Preston-Galt highway was undertaken yesterday, and the local suburban roads commission has been advised of the transfer of a strip of road running from East Main street to the Galt-Hamilton highway to its control, and that body lost no time in having this last connecting link between Galt and the highway built to suit the highways, work having been started to regrade it prior to being paved.

When this link and a short strip on Dundas street for which the city council will have a bylaw presented to it, are completed, there will be continuous pavement from the old Delmonte Hotel in Preston through Galt to the Hamilton highway, work on which is being rushed, with only a short strip below Galt to be completed.

The first carload of the wood purchased by the civic fuel committee arrived today.

Galt's schools are well supplied with coal, the board having made its annual purchase early in the year. In a building fund campaign in the district during the past three months, the Ladies' Aid of the Preston Methodist Church raised the substantial sum of \$1,500.35 by a series of social evenings and unique undertakings. The money is to be used in paying for the new church Sunday school building, which is about completed.

The Hespeler Horticultural Society's annual exhibition was held Thursday and today, and proved a very successful event, with large exhibits of fruit, vegetables and flowers, and large attendances.

MAGISTRATE ORDERS DOG TO BE DESTROYED
