

WINNIPEG WHEAT RECORDS SLUMP

Advances 2 1-4 in Morning—
Closed 1-2 to 2 1-2 Lower.

Winnipeg, Oct. 16.—Wheat prices advanced to 2½c before midday today but, with outside business lacking slumped sharply during the last hour.

At \$1.20. October closed at \$1.25 1/2. Export business worked today totalling around the 300,000-bushel mark. A better demand from English millers for distant Manitoba parcels was reported. There was active trading in barley but other coarse grains looked inactive.

Persistent lack of rain in two of the largest wheat growing districts of Australia was reported in some of the advices current here as having already caused early-sown wheat to deteriorate to the extent of 50,000,000 bushels and

as being still unthreshed in Canada and being damaged by adverse weather. Furthermore, Russian shipments came smaller than expected, and Argentine shipments also showed a substantial decrease.

Another feature of the interesting developments at the last was that the price differences between Chicago and

Corn and oats paralleled the action of wheat. Upturns in corn values were partly due to wet weather, unfavorable for conditioning the new crop.
