Chief, Ardagh pointed out that there are hardly enough fire stations now to reach the outskirts of the city in good time to save a burning building, and as the rest of the committee was perfectly satisfied with the report it was adopted. A committee consisting of Ald. Gowanlock and Lamb was appointed to wait on the different underwriters in the city and see if something cannot be done to lower the insurance rate, as they considered that too much money is paid into insurance companies every year.

After the Assessors.

After the Assessors Assessment Commissioner Maughan reported that he could not carry on the work of the department with fewer assistants than he now has. There are 14 assessors

than he now has. There are 14 assessors employed from July, 1 to Sept. 36 every year at a salary of \$562.

Aldermen Gowanlock and Sheppard thought that the work could be done with half the number of men if they started at Jan. I instead of July, and moved accordingly. The motion was allowed to drop, and the matter was left over so as to give Mr. Maughan a chance to consider and report at another meeting whether he could not do with less men. Ald. Gowanlock thought that the assessors' clerks should be dispensed with, as he does not see any reason why the assessor cannot do the work of the clerk himself. The reports of Inspector Awde of the License Department and Curran Morrison, the Police Court clerk, were also received and adopted. The largest part of the business of the committee is yet to be transacted.

This is the same price as was paid last year, but it was pointed out to the committee that since that contract was awarded the schedule of prices for making clothing has been raised and that it costs a tailor \$6.70 to have a suit made. Plans of the John-street Bridge. The bridge will be of iron and will consist of six spans, two of 140 feet and the remainder 100 feet. The roadway will be 30 feet wide, and there will be a six-foot sidewalk on each side. The C.P.R. also submitted the plans for the bridge to be erected by them at York-street, and these will also be approved, subject to the approval of the G.T.R.

FINANCE AND TRADE.

The trading on the local Stock Exchange was not as active as during the previous week. Prices were somewhat erratic, but the tone generally is firm. Money is un-changed, with call loans ruling at 4½ per cent. on choice collateral, and in Montreal this rate has been shaded to some brokers.

"The trade in wholesale dry goods has been fair during the week," said a representative of John Maddonald & Co., "but the volume was hardly up to last week. The trade since the millinery openings began is hardly up to that of the corresponding period of last year. Stocks in the country are probably smaller, and a good feature is that merchants show an increased disposition to take advantage of cash discounts."

There has been a great falling off in the imports of drygoods at this port in February, the total value being only \$589,412, as against \$806,741 in February of last year.

Wheat closed a little stronger at Chicago yesterday, but the following statistical position, as reported by Bradstreet's, is not very encouraging: "If to the Government report of 114,000,000 bushels of wheat in farmers' hands on March 1 be added 117,000,000 bushels out of tarmers' hands the resulting 231,000,000 bushels will supply feed and seed for four months to come, a reserve on July 1 next of 40,000,000 bushels amonth for export, which is more than will be demanded. 
