

THE ADVANCE IN WHEAT.

Resisted the Farmer Not the Speculator... Ottawa, June 19, 1895. W. H. Montague, Secretary of State, has received the following letter from Mr. Robert Meighen of Montreal, President of the Lake of the Woods Milling Co.:

Dear Sir:—I notice in the Globe of yesterday's date that one of the Liberator's made the statement that the Government and organized attempt is being made to persuade the farmers of Canada that the cause of the increase in the price of wheat, they are making money. I do not think that it is even necessary to try and persuade the farmer; his knowledge is a positive fact that since the close of navigation, or in other words, since the 1st of December, 1894, the Manitoba farmer has received a substantial advance for his wheat over an export basis of from 5 to 10 cents per bushel.

I also notice the fact of the gentleman I refer to quoting from the Toronto World a large number of names, who, it is alleged, have made money speculating in wheat. I presume he is aware that quite a number of speculators in the Dominion confine their operations exclusively to Chicago and the United States dealers, but it is a large amount of money has been made by many speculators during the last three years, it is now generally reported that there has been a sharp decline in the price of wheat on the right side of the Chicago wheat market lately. I presume as long as a portion of the wheat is sold to the Liberator, he has no objection to the Canadian speculators on the Chicago market taking chances on the price of wheat in a world which may say that since January, 1895, the stocks of wheat held by millers and speculators in the Dominion were much lower than they have been for a number of years, consequently in the advance which has taken place the farmer who was the principal holder must be the party who benefited from the upward turn of the market.
