"SHINNY" AND A SHOTGUN.

A BOY FIRES A BROADSIDE AT A COMPANION  
WHO WHIPPED HIM.

Port Huron, Jan. 2.—A tragic sequel to a  
New Year's game of "shinny" occurred on  
a north Port Huron skating rink yesterday  
afternoon. Patrick Burns, aged 17, was  
shot in the face by Frank Lander, a young  
lad of 14.

Lander, who was hit with a shinny stick,  
got angry and called Burns names. Burns  
struck the boy, who then went home, ob-  
tained a double-barreled shotgun, and re-  
turned to the playground, where Burns was  
still playing. He deliberately raised the  
gun and fired at Burns, when within 15 feet

will probably lose his eye-sight.

Lander is now in jail. He is said to have  
stabbed a boy named Higgins a couple of  
weeks ago with a jackknife. Young Burns  
is the son of the late ex-treasurer of the  
county, and a bright lad, who was attending  
business college.

After Lander fired he raised his gun for a  
second shot, but was overpowered, and the  
gun taken from him. He then started to  
run away and got as far as the tunnel when  
the officers captured him.

EAST LAMBTON FARMERS.

INTERESTING PROCEEDINGS OF THE ANNUAL  
MEETING OF THE INSTITUTE.

Forest, Ont., Jan. 4.—The eighteenth  
public meeting of the East Lambton Farm-  
ers' Institute was held in the Town Hall  
this week. There were in all five sessions,  
and much interest and enthusiasm was  
manifested in the meeting throughout. The  
attendance was only medium, ranging in  
numbers from 30 to 150. The officers of the  
Institute, however, were greatly pleased in  
securing upwards of 50 members.

During the first day Mr. Jos. Osborne,  
Secretary of the Institute, gave an excellent  
address on "hoed crops vs. bare fallow." In  
which he pointed out the great expense of  
the bare fallow system and the utmost im-  
portance of taking the greatest care in the  
thorough cultivation of the hoed crop. He  
advocated planting corn in hills, four feet  
apart, each way, for the sake of giving the  
best chance of clearing the land.

Mr. C. A. Zavitz, B.S.A., experimentalist  
at the Ontario Agricultural College, then  
explained the system of experimental work  
conducted at the College, and pointed out  
the grains most suitable for the Ontario far-  
mer to grow. Upon this very important  
subject Mr. Zavitz was asked many ques-  
tions, and a deep interest was shown by  
those present.

Mr. L. Paton, of Oxford Mills, spoke upon  
the great advantage of paying for milk for  
the cheese factory according to the quality  
the milk, as indicated by the percentage of  
butterfat. The Babcock test was a complete  
success in testing the milk for butterfat, and  
was adopted in several factories in Eastern  
Ontario with great satisfaction. This sys-  
tem for paying for milk is adopted in a  
factory near Forest, and is well liked.

Mr. D. W. Beadle, B. A., of Toronto, ad-  
dressed the meeting upon the most trouble-  
some insects which attack the apples, fully  
explaining the manner of spraying for the  
codlin moth.

In the evening session very able addresses  
were delivered by Messrs. L. Paton, D. W.  
Beadle, C. A. Zavitz and C. A. Barnes, the  
last named gentleman being the Public  
School Inspector for the district.

The Mayor of Forest occupied the chair,  
and the string band supplied the music  
throughout the evening.

During the second day the attendance  
was good, the interest and discussion being  
even more lively than during the first day.  
The speakers during the second day were  
Messrs. Beadle, Paton, Zavitz and T. C.  
Wheatley.

Mr. Wheatley gave two addresses, one in  
which he pointed out the great importance  
of every farmer keeping a system of book-  
keeping, even though that be very simple.  
He gave his own experience of the past  
twenty years, and brought out many valu-  
able points. The other address was upon  
weeds, and illustrated as it was with speci-  
mens of pressed weeds, made a very in-  
structive address.

The discussions throughout were excel-  
lent, some of those who took the most active  
part being Messrs. Hiram Rawlings, Stutt,  
Osborne, McLean, McAlpine, Hilborn and  
others. The delegation got from Forest to  
Bridgen and Petrolia, where the Institutes  
for West Lambton are to be held.
