GOVERNMENT CREAMERIES.

The Province Controls the Majority of Them in Alberta.

Edmonton, Nov. 28.—The Alberta Government has now secured the control of the manufacture and sale of butter in over half of Alberta. They refuse to sell this butter to consumers, and will only sell it to retailers who order a regular supply all the year around. This rule is adhered to in spite of the fact that a supply of butter cannot be produced in the Province sufficient for home consumption. A large portion of the butter sold by the Government is shipped out of the Province to points in British Columbia, Yukon Territory and even to China and Japan. There are 20 or 22 creameries in operation in the Province. The creameries under Government control do not interfere at all with the others, it is stated, their idea not being to compete with other creameries in order to lower the price, but to provide creameries where there were none established. Only expert men are employed as butter makers in the Government-owned creameries so that a good quality of butter is invariably insured.

A Well Earned Trophy.

The International Live Stock Exposition of Chicago is one of the greatest institutions of its kind in the world. It ought to be so, for it has its place in a great and wealthy city, in an intensely agricultural State, and in the very heart of the live stock industry of the west. For its prizes there is the keenest competition between places and institutions both at home and abroad, and among the latter are the agricultural colleges maintained by the neighboring States.

The contest that excites the keenest interest each year is the team competition in live stock judging. The student teams this year were from the State colleges of Indiana, South Dakota, Kansas, Texas, Ohio, Iowa, and Missouri, against all of which was pitted the team from the Ontario Agricultural College. This trophy put up as the prize was won last year and the year before by the Ontario team, and last week they won it again. Under the conditions of the competition it now becomes the property of the Agricultural College, where it will have a permanent home.

BY-LAW NO. 13, 1907, OF TOWNSHIP OF WARWICK.

A By-law to provide for drainage work in the Township of Warwick, in the County of Lambton, and for borrowing on the credit of the municipality the sum of \$252.30 for completing the same. Provisionally adopted the 11th day of Nov. 1907.

Whereas Thomas Brush, a party to be benefited by the drainage work has petitioned the Council of the said Township of Warwick, to have the Six Side Road Drain extended to a proper outlet.

And whereas thereupon the said Council has procured an examination (under Section 76 of the Municipal Drainage Act.) to be made by C. A. Jones, being a person competent for each purpose, of the said area proposed to be drained and the means suggested for the drainage thereof and of other lands and roads liable to assessment under the Municipal Drainage Act, and has also procured plans, specifications and estimates of the drainage work to be made by the said C. A. Jones, and an assessment to be made by him of the lands and roads to be benefited by such drainage work, and of lands and roads liable for contribution thereto, stating as nearly as he can the proportion of benefit, outlet liability, and injurious liability which in his opinion will be derived or incurred in consequence of such drainage work by every road affected, or portion of lot, the said assessment so made being the assessment hereinafter by this bylaw enacted to be assessed and levied upon the roads and lots or parts of lots hereinafter in that behalf especially set forth and described, and the report of the said C. A. Jones in respect thereof and of the said drainage work being as follows:

Patrols, Sept 4th, 1907.

To the Municipal Council, Township of Warwick.

GENTLEMEN:—In accordance with instructions received from Honorable Body I have made a survey for the extension of the 67 sided road, con. 1, S.E.R., of your Township, to a more efficient outlet.

The present termination of work on this drain is on the 67 lot 7, con. 1, S.E.R., about 24 rods east of the 67 sided road and I am now proposing to extend it across lot 7, crossing the Blind Line, between cons. 1 and 2, 16 rods west of the line between lots 7 and 8, then continuing easterly along the westerly side of said Blind Line 32 rods, then southerly about 2 1/2 rods where it empties into a drain owned by the 67 lot 7, con. 1, for bridge, 28 rods, as shown more particularly by red line on the accompanying plan of the locality.

I am starting the upper end of the proposed work at st. 68 on the former survey of Sept., 1904, as the lower portion of the previous work has filled up considerably owing to the rapid fall in the drain above. This st. 68 is about 5 1/2 rods above the point where the drain leaves the sidewalk and enters lot 7, and I have made the line between the E and W halves of lot 7, at 105 2 1/2 rods where it crosses the Blind Line, and st. 112 is at the outlet into the drain above referred to.

The bottom width of the drain will be 3 ft. and the side slopes 1 horizontal to 1 vertical.

The average depth across lot 7 will be about 2 ft., and along the Blind Line about 1 ft. 8 in.

I have prepared a plan and profile of the work, specification, estimate of cost and schedule of assessment, all of which I herewith submit.

4th. For paying the sum of \$9.80 the amount assessed against the said roads of the Municipality and for covering interest thereon for 2 years at the rate of 4 per centum per annum, a special rate on the dollar, sufficient to produce the required yearly amount thereof shall over and above all other rates be levied and collected, (in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes are levied and collected) upon and from the whole rateable property in the said Township of Warwick, in each year for two years, after the final passing of this bylaw, during which the said debentures have to run.

5th. This bylaw shall be published once in every week for four consecutive weeks in the GRIFFIN-ADVOCATE newspaper, published in the Village of Watford, and shall come into force upon and after the final passing thereof and may be cited as the Six Side Road Drain Outlet By-law.

SPECIFICATION OF WORK.

The drain is to be dug to the depths and dimensions shown and figured on the accompanying profile with sides sloped 1 horizontal to 1 vertical and with the bottom an even grade between stations.

Should any error appear in the figured depth at any stake, the grade is nevertheless to be made to conform with that shown on the profile.

Where the course of the drain is a straight line the centre line is to be 6 ft. from the line of the stakes and on the numbered side thereof and where the course is a curve, as from st. 83 1/2 to 89, and from 92 to 95, it is to be made a gradual and even curve the full length of said curve and all turns are also to be made a gradual curve.

All trees or stumps are to be grubbed out of the course of the drain and all logs and stumps are to be removed to a width of 1 rod on each side of the bank.

From st. 65 to 69, the earth is to be cast and spread on the centre of the road.

From st. 69 to 103+40, the earth is to be cast about equally on each side and 3 ft. clear of the edge.

From st. 103+40 to 111 1/2, the earth is all to be cast to the south side of the drain, 3 ft. clear of the edge.

From st. 111 1/2 to 112, the earth is to be cast about equally on each side and 3 ft. clear of the edge.

All the work to be done to the entire satisfaction of the commissioner in charge of the work.

And whereas the said Council are of opinion that the drainage of the area described is desirable, Therefore the said Municipal Council of the said Township of Warwick, pursuant to the provisions of The Municipal Drainage Act, enacts as follows:

1st. The said report, plans, specifications, assessments and estimates are hereby adopted, and from the undermentioned lots and parts of lots, and roads and the amount of the said special rates and interest at each lot or part of lot respectively shall be divided into 2 equal parts, and one such part shall be assessed, levied and collected as aforesaid, in each year for 2 years after the final passing of this bylaw, during which the said debentures have to run.

2nd. The Reeve of the said Municipality may borrow on the credit of the corporation of the said Township of Warwick the sum of \$252.30, being the funds necessary for the work not otherwise provided for and may issue debentures of the corporation to that amount in sum of not less than \$50.00 each, and payable within 2 years from the date thereof, with interest at the rate of 4 per centum per annum, that is to say in 2 equal annual payments, such debentures to be payable at the Treasurer's office, Warwick, and to have attached to them coupons for the payment of interest.

3rd. For paying the sum of \$15.00 the amount charged against the said lands and roads for benefit, and the sum of \$127.50 the amount charged against the said lands and roads for outlet liability, apart from lands and roads belonging to or controlled by the Municipality, and for covering interest thereon for two years at the rate of 4 per centum per annum, the following total special rates over and above all other rates shall be assessed, levied and collected (in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes are levied and collected) upon and from the undermentioned lots and parts of lots, and roads and the amount of the said special rates and interest at each lot or part of lot respectively shall be divided into 2 equal parts, and one such part shall be assessed, levied and collected as aforesaid, in each year for 2 years after the final passing of this bylaw, during which the said debentures have to run.
