Forest ratepayers will vote at the municipal electron in January on the following by-laws: Waterworks, sewer-age, electric light, canning factory and local option.


Petrolea won the Junior O. R. F. championship on Saturday in a game with Hamilton at London. The game was played on ground covered with three inches of snow.
