Mrs. John Waterworth died at Glencee on Friday, aged 83 years. Her husband, who predeceased her many years ago, was at one time member of the legislature.

Greenhouse cucumbers are now being marketed by Leamington growers, and about the middle of this month it is expected that tomatoes will be ready to ship.

P. J. McHugh, of the Market House, London, recently paid \$80.04 for 80 Plymouth Rock hens. Mr. Branton, of Lobo, was the man who raised the birds and sold them.

A Battalion Bank, designed to promote a saving spirit among the men, has been inaugurated by the 33rd Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Force, in training at London, Ont.

The oldest resident of Dunwich, in the person of Mrs. Eliza Garbutt, died a few days ago on the farm on which she was born in that township, having reached the advanced age of 93 years.

The Kingsville Reporter of last week records a remarkable birthday celebration. It says: "Monday last three sisters, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Wigle, celebrated their birthdays



at the home of the youngest, each born on the 8th of March and 7 years apart.

We doubt if a similar circumstance could be recorded in any other family in the Dominion of Canada.

James Fray, a former well-known resident of Bosanquet, died in Detroit on Monday, aged 65 years.

The death occurred Tuesday at his home in Adelaide Township of William R. Bolton, in his 30th year.

He was sergeant in the 25th Middlesex Regiment and was one of those chosen to represent the regiment in England at the time of the King's coronation.

The "pay-up week" is a new idea which, starting in a small town in Wisconsin, is rapidly spreading over the Western States.

The philosophy of the plan is simply this: that by paying your bills, the other fellow is enabled to pay his, and so on in a sort of endless chain, which finally comes around to you again, with you out of debt, and no one owing you.

Thus all are quits, the commercial skies are clear, and everybody feels better.

War Summary

April 5.—There has been little fighting on the western front.

The French have taken the village of Regnevillie in the Weevre department from the Germans, while the Germans have driven the Belgians from the village of Dret Grachten on the west bank of the Yser canal.

Reports reaching Petrograd are to the effect that the Turkish armored cruiser Medjidieh has been sunk by a mine in the Black Sea off the Russian coast.

Two steamers have been blown up as a result of the naval warfare. A German submarine has destroyed a British steamer in the English Channel off the southern end of the coast of Cornwall.

April 6.—The German submarine U-31 has sunk the Russian bark Hernes at the British vessel Olivine.

Great excitement has been caused in Genoa by the receipt of a report that a German submarine has sunk the Italian steamer Luigi Parodi, which left Baltimore on January 22 with coal for Genoa.

The Italian authorities have taken strong measures to protect the German colony. The crew of the Luigi Parodi was made up entirely of Genoese, and nothing has been heard from them.

The Bulgarian Government has explained that rebels were responsible for the recent seizure of Serbia, and has promised to take steps to disarm them.

The United States Government has made public the note sent to Germany on the sinking of the American ship William P. Fry by the German auxiliary cruiser Prinz Eitel Friedrich.

Indemnification with interest is asked. The Dutch Government has notified the United States that any foreign ship which flies the Dutch flag or in any other way pretends to be of German nationality will not be permitted to leave or pass through waters governed by the Netherlands.

The King of England has taken a definite stand on the question of tectonism. In an official announcement His Majesty commands that no wines or spirits shall be used by any of his householders after April 8.

April 7.—It is still on the Carpathian mountains that the most bitter fighting is in progress.

The Russians have crossed the principal chain in the region of the Rostok Pass and occupied two villages on the slopes of the Hungarian side of the mountains.

This claim is made by the Russian war office, which asserts that all along this front the Russians have continued to make progress.

The assertions of Petrograd are not borne out by the Austrian official statement, which declares that, in conjunction with German forces, the Austrians have captured two strong positions on the heights east of the Laborca Valley, and repulsed strong Russian attacks in nearby sections, capturing 7,570 prisoners.

In addition, Vienna says that on the Dneister River two Russian battalions have been annihilated. To the north, in Poland, only desultory fighting is going on in the vicinity of the East Prussian frontier.

Unofficial reports reaching London are to the effect that British warships again are bombarding Smyrna.

Warmbad, German Southwest Africa, has been taken without opposition by the Union of South Africa forces.

Lord Kitchener has decided to wait no longer for the workmen of Great Britain voluntarily to take up the task of manufacturing munitions of war necessary for the prosecution of the combat, and has appointed a committee to obtain sufficient labor for this purpose.

The French press bureau asserts that from figures compiled from official German casualty lists it has been ascertained that since the war began the Germans have lost over half of their officers.

Of 52,805 officers it is declared that up to March 15, 9,923 had been killed and that 21,531 had been wounded or were missing.


