The annual picnic of St. Peter's church sabbath school will be held next Saturday afternoon at Victoria Park.

Mr. E. P. Clement and family left this morning for Port Keweenaw, Muskoka. Mr. Clement will return in a day or two but the others will remain until the end of August.

Miss Mary Lipsett is going on an extended trip to London, England starting today. Her many friends wish her a pleasant journey and safe return.

Mrs. Geo. Potter and her son Alex. and her two sisters, Mrs. Adam Dreher and Miss Meila Oberlander, of Cullman, Alabama, who have been visiting Mr. Potter here, left on Thursday for Syracuse, N. Y. where they will spend the summer at the cottage of their father, Rev. Alex. Oberlander.

The chief open air entertainment consisted in two hair raising high dives by Lieutenant Geo. Elmore, the chicken and timekeeper at the Sugar City. He had erected a stand 46 feet above the surface of the pond at the flood gates. "From a he dove twice into the water, which is about 16 feet deep there, and into which the plucky diver went to a depth of eight feet. Both leaps were made backward. Mr. Elmore turning a complete revolution in the air and striking the water with his feet. After the exhibition he was taken to the dressing room by Mr. Harry Schade, the popular postmaster, in his large canopied row boat.

Mr. Elmore is a gentleman most interesting to meet and who has followed the profession of high diving for years past. He made a dive of 140 feet in height in Los Angeles, and was the champion of the world. This dive of Friday's was the first he has made for five years. He never did a second forced dive as he has a silver plate over a portion of his skull ever since he was sand-bagged in St. Louis, Mo., in 1896. Fear of injuring his head makes him come down feet foremost.

Mr. Elmore served in the American militia for several years. He was with the Philippine and China expedition with a Kentucky Company in Porto Rico. In 1899 he was a prisoner in a Philippine fort—the parade on the outer wall being 50 feet high and with a deep river running by, immediately below. Elmore saw here an opportunity to escape and induced two comrades to make the leap with him. They were all successful, and travelling by night and sleeping by day, they made their way back to their company. The prison authorities reported him as dead and the news was sent to his home, only to be proven false when he turned up safe and sound several months after.
