Twenty-fifth Wedding Anniversary

MEMBERS OF WINDSOR METHODIST CHURCH CELEBRATE TWENTY-FIFTH WEDDING ANNIVERSARY OF REV. AND MRS. W. H. LANGILLE.

On Saturday evening a large number of the members of the Windsor Methodist church congregation assembled at the parsonage to celebrate the twenty-fifth wedding anniversary of Rev. W. H. and Mrs. Langille. The Y's of which both are members, first started the idea of commemorating this important occasion, and the congregation were only too pleased to assist, and thus show their appreciation of their pastor and his wife in the grand work which they are furthering in our midst. Although less than a year they have resided in our town, the love and respect manifest in all with whom they have come in contact, has endeared them to many outside their own congregation, and the hospitality shown at the parsonage can be well understood by the congregations throughout the Province, who have been fortunate in having Mr. Langille as their pastor. Since their sojourn here the Philanthropic and Bazaar classes have been established, the latter having a membership of over fifty.

The guests congregated shortly after eight, and the surprise to Mr. Langille was genuine. A beautiful bouquet of carnations, tied with long white satin streamers, and a handsome primula, were presented on behalf of the Y's by Mrs. George Kirkpatrick. This was followed by the wedding march, played by Miss Sadie Huestis on the mandolin. Then a four pyramid bride's cake was carried in by two ladies and gentlemen, and Mrs. Langille was requested to cut the smaller cake. The task seemed rather difficult, but when the outer portion was removed, a shower of silver fell to the floor. It amounted to \$25, and was in silver \$5, 10, 25 and 50 cent pieces. It was every way a happy evening, and before the close delicious refreshments were served by the Y's, who also presented the pyramidal cake. The bride and groom were showered with congratulations, and received a number of other presents which those already mentioned.

Two or five years ago, Feb. 22nd, Mr. and Mrs. Langille were married in the presence of Rev. Joseph Sellar, at the home of Captain J. C. Rogers, Carleton, N.S. Mrs. Langille was formerly Miss Mary Nelson Johnson, was a daughter of the late Mr. James Johnson, of Onslow, who the previous December had relinquished their golden wedding. Mr. Langille was ordained in 1882, and was at the time of his marriage in charge of a portion of the Annapolis Valley circuit with Rev. William Ryan, and took his bride there, and the following July was pastor of the Methodist church at Kentville, Hanse Journal.

Premier Fruit Area of Canada

ANNAPOLIS VALLEY BOY CHAMPIONS THE FRUIT RAISING PROPERTIES OF HIS NATIVE SOIL, IN THE OTTAWA FREE PRESS.

The following circular has been issued to members of the Newspaper Profession in Nova Scotia:—
After consultation by mail with members of the executive of the Nova Scotia Press Association, Thursday, March 12th, has been selected as the date for the Semi-Annual meeting at Halifax, in the City Hall, at 10 o'clock, a. m. There are a number of important matters to be discussed, and it is suggested that members plan to arrive in Halifax on March 11th, in order to have a full day next day for business.

A committee is arranging a programme for the meeting. This is not yet complete, but it has been suggested that this notice include a reference to some of the matters to be brought up.
Mr. Fred E. Cox, Middleton Outlook will present a paper advocating incorporation with the I. C. R. of small railways in Nova Scotia, particularly the Dominion Atlantic Railway. The matter of improved transportation is becoming of greater consequence yearly to the people of the Maritime Provinces. Government ownership is a question deserving careful attention.

Mr. J. M. Lawson, of Yarmouth, an enthusiastic member of the Nova Scotia Press Association, has intimated that he will ask the Halifax meeting to deal with a recommendation that more publicity be given to estate notices now published in the Royal Gazette. Mr. Lawson's idea is, the law should be amended to require the insertion of estate and company notices, etc., in at least one paper in the county affected. This is a reasonable suggestion which should appeal to every publisher.

"The Eastern Chronicle" of Friday Feb. 14th, calls attention to the new regulation of the Canadian Post Office Department, fixing daily newspapers from the burdensome postage rate of 1907, but withholding this relief from the weekly papers of the country. The Eastern Chronicle, continuing, says: "It is to be hoped that every weekly will send a representative to attend the meeting of the Press Association in March, in Halifax, so that united action may be taken."
Another matter to be offered for consideration, and which is somewhat related to Mr. Lawson's excellent proposal, emanates from myself, viz., that copies of all bills presented to the local legislature as soon as printed should be sent to each provincial newspaper, and that the local government should subscribe for and keep on file at Halifax the different papers of the province. The sending of copies of bills to provincial papers will afford editors an opportunity of knowing if proposed new legislation affects local interests.

The influence of the Nova Scotia Press Association is coming to be generally recognized, and valuable additional testimony of this was offered not so very long ago by the statement that it was the influence of the newspaper that effected the sudden cancellation of foreign consorting privileges.

In concluding I might say that not only are apples cultivated extensively, and under the most modern and approved system, but nearly all fruit is grown successfully, namely pears, plum grapes, cherries, and, in some places, peaches; and yet I am frequently asked by intelligent people if the climate down there is not too cold for fruit growing. I would say so and so.

Go through the beautiful valley in June, and for miles ride through an apple forest, with the air fragrant with apple blossom. It is one of the most beautiful sights to be witnessed in Canada to-day. Then take the same trip the first of October, and see those same forests bowed to the ground with their burden of golden fruit. It will readily make those unacquainted with the country a broader and better Canadian, and fill them with a greater patriotism, if possible, than possessed before.—Respectfully,

It is evident from the number of subjects proposed by members for consideration that interest in the work of the Association is growing, and likewise members are appreciating the fact that the Association is a valuable channel through which to accomplish reforms. The forthcoming meeting at Halifax on March 12th promises to be an exceptionally good one, with much important business to transact.

The members of the executive will appreciate suggestions from newspapersmen of the province, and cordially welcome new subjects to add to the programme for the meeting, which is not yet closed up. You are asked as a particular favor to write at once to the secretary, Mr. H. C. Harris, Kentville, stating whether you will attend the meeting at Halifax, which it is earnestly hoped you will make an effort to do, and also if there is any subject you would like to have brought up.
