

The New Champion Press is made in five sizes, and two grades, except the 6 x 10, which has but two form rollers (the others carry three), the higher priced Presses having wrought-iron polished side-aims, cut gears, turned fly-wheel, and impression throw-off. The cheap presses can be furnished with an impression throw-off, if wanted, (except the 6 x 16), for \$15.00 extra.

Each Press is furnished with three cast rollers; three extra roller stocks, three chases, one roller mould, and a wrench (except the 6 x 10, which has two cast rollers, two extra roller stocks, two chairs and a wrench.)
