For scalding poultry, the water should be as near to For scalding poultry, the water should be as near to the boiling point as possible, without actually bening. The bird held by the legs, should be immersed and lifted up and down in the water three times. Continue to hold the bird by the legs with one hand while placking the feathers with the other, without a moment's delay after taking out. If skilfully handled in this way, the feathers and pin-feathers may all be removed without breaking the skin. A torn or broken skin greatly injures the appearance. 4th. The intestines should not be "drawn." After removing the feathers, the head may be taken off and the skin drawn over the neck bone and tied. This is the best method, though much comes to market with skin drawn over the neck bone and tied. This is the best method, though much comes to market with heads on. 5th. It should next be "plunged," by being dipped about two seconds into water nearly, or quite, bosting hot, and then at once into cold water about the same length of time. It should be enterely cold, but not frozen, before being packed, bith. In packing use clean hand-threshed rye straw. If this cannot be had, wheat or oat-straw will answer, but be sure that it is clean and free from dust. Place a layer of straw at the bottom, then alternate layers of poultry and straw, taking care to stow snugly, back layer of straw at the bottom, then alternate layers of poultry and straw, taking care to stow snugly, back upwards, legs under the body, filling vacancies with straw, and filling the package so that the cover will drive down very closely upon the contents, to prevent shifting on the way. Boxes are the best packages, and should contain from, say 150 to 300 pounds.
