



Rev. Father Morin Working Among His People in Kansas. Rev. Father Morin, who has been actively engaged in immigration work for the past few years, and has brought several parties to fhe Northwest from Quebec, is now working in Kansas and arrived in the City from that State Wednesday alternoon. There are some two hundred families there ready to move in the spring, but need assistance to reach their distination. The Reverend

Father leaves on Monday for Ottawa to interview members of the Dominion Government and elicit their aid in the work. He would like a grant of \$100 to
