CANCER RESEARCH

1. Has any public body been set up in Canada to coordinate cancer research?

2. If so, how does it function?

3. Has any initiative been taken in setting up cancer diagnostic clinics and treatment centres?

4. What financial aid is being given to cancer research centres by the government?

5. What fellowships are being granted for purposes of cancer research?

6. What facilities are available for post-graduate training of suitable doctors in diagnosis and treatment of cancer?

Mr. MARTIN:

1. Yes. The National Cancer Institute of Canada incorporated as a voluntary, non-profit organization, under part II of The Companies Act, on March 24, 1947.

2. Representatives of the following organizations have been requested to form a voting body who will administer the affairs of the institute through a board of directors: Canadian Cancer Society; Medical Research Division of the National Research Council; Association of Canadian Medical Colleges; Diagnostic and treatment cancer centres;
