## PROVISION OF FREIGHT CARS FOR BRITISH COLUMBIA LUMBER INDUSTRY

**Mr. Frank Oberle (Prince George-Peace River):** Mr. Speaker, I wish to direct a question to the Minister of Transport. Further to a question I asked his parliamentary secretary about two weeks ago relating to the acute shortage of railway rolling stock for the lumber industry in British Columbia, can the minister today tell the House if his discussions with the provincial government have resulted in a solution for this very serious problem?

Hon. Jean Marchand (Minister of Transport): Is the hon. member referring only to the discussion on boxcars or to the whole discussion with the government of British Columbia?

**Mr. Oberle:** I am referring to boxcars which are in short supply for the lumber industry in British Columbia.

**Mr. Marchand (Langelier):** Mr. Speaker, discussions are being carried on not mainly with the government of British Columbia but with the Americans. This is where our boxcars are and the CNR and CPR are trying to get back as many cars as they can.

Hon. Mitchell Sharp (Secretary of State for External Affairs): Mr. Speaker, we have made direct representations to the French government on this question on a number of occasions and I am very happy to say that on the last occasion I was able to transmit the views of this parliament.
