### MR. DE MONTIGNY MARCHAND

### Question No. 1,446—Miss MacDonald:

- 1. (a) Prior to his appointment as associate under-secretary of state for External Affairs, what position did Mr. de Montigny Marchand hold (b) what was his salary and to whom did he report?
- 2. During this period, did Mr. de Montigny Marchand live in Europe and, if so, were his expenses paid by the government and what was the total amount?
- 3. (a) Upon completion of this assignment, did Mr. de Montigny Marchand prepare a report and, if so, to whom did he present the report (b) was the report made public (c) how long is the report?

Hon. Mark MacGuigan (Secretary of State for External Affairs): In so far as the Department of External Affairs is concerned, the reply is as follows:

- (a) Mr. Marchand was requested to do a study of Canada's relations with France and the Federal Republic of Germany. This study started on May 1, 1979 and was to last for a period of one year.
  - (b) Mr. Marchand belonged to the SX-4 class, the salary range of which was then \$45,000 to \$65,500. He reported to the Clerk of the Privy Council.
- 2. Mr. Marchand lived in Paris, and the government paid his expenses according to the foreign service directives, for a total amount of \$50,991.89.
- 3. Mr. Marchand's mission was cut short by his appointment as associate under-secretary of state for External Affairs on March 25, 1980. He debriefed himself verbally through a series of meetings with senior officials, both federal and provincial, and with representatives of the private sector. Written conclusions of his study are being prepared. It has never been envisaged that these would be made public.
